TRURO CITY

Truro City Football Club was established in 1889, becoming a funder member of the CCFA, which came into being at a meeting at the Royal Hotel in Truro on 18th September of that year.

Other Clubs present at that meeting were Porthcurno, Penzance, Probus School, Liskeard, Dunheved School, Torpoint and Millbrook. Truro City's first recorded match was played at Truro College against Penzance on 4th October 1889, which they won 7-1. Further games were played at Tolgarrick, adjacent to the existing Treyew Road ground and the club has also played at Kenwyn and Chapel Hill. A 5-0 victory over Launceston in 1895 brought the club's first trophy, the Cornwall Senior Cup, which Truro City has now won 15 times.

The club initially participated in the Plymouth & District League. In 1931 they achieved one of the finest run of results in club history, playing nine games in 15 days, winning eight and drawing one. However, the club left the league that same year, along with several other Cornish Clubs, after a dispute over payment of Devon Clubs' travelling expenses.

City joined the newly formed Cornwall Senior League, winning it in 1932 and 1933. However, disappointing gates in the new league saw City rejoining the Plymouth &

District League in 1934 and won the title in 1937.

Departure from the Cornwall Senior League led to the club being barred from entering the Cornwall Senior Cup. The CCFA refused a proposal for the club's reserve team to enter the competition and City were only re-admitted 1938 (they won the Senior Cup in their first season back).

The club has also won the Durning Lawrence Charity Cup, which Truro City gave to the county, 11 times, the first in 1912 and the last in 1981.

Truro City was one of the founder members of the South Western League, which was formed in 1951. However, the club did not meet with immediate success, having to seek re-election for the first two seasons. They have had to seek re-election twice more, in 1982 and 1983. Their first championship came in 1960/61 and they have been champions four times since: 1969/70, 1992/93, 1995/96 and 1997/98.

The South Western League Cup has come to Treyew Road on three occasions: 1959/60, 1966/67 and 1997/98. The League's Sporting Trophy was won in 1974/75 and 1988/89 and the Best Ground Trophy in 1995/96. City were forced to leave the South Western League at



the end of the 1974/75 season as the Treyew Road ground had been part a road-widening scheme and it was 1978 before they were re-admitted.

The club won the Cornwall Combination League title in 1994/95, 1998/99, 2005/6 and 2007/8 and the Combination League Cup on nine occasions: 1968, 1978, 1987, 1988, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2005/6 and 2007/8. The Evely Cup has been won seven times: 1968, 1978, 1986, 1988, 1999, 2000 and 2005/06.

In late 2004, the club was acquired by a new owner and in 2005/06 the club ended the season as runners-up, winning promotion to the Toolstation Western League.

The 2006/07 season was the most successful in the Club's history: winning the

Toolstation Western League First Division by a record margin at the first attempt, retaining the Cornwall Senior Cup and winning the FA Vase at the new Wembley Stadium with a 3-1 win over AFC Totton

The FA Vase campaign set two new benchmarks. It was the first time a club playing at Step 6 in the Football Pyramid had won the trophy and the final was watched by a record crowd of over 37,000.

Success continued in 2007/08, as a 17 point winning margin in the Toolstation Western League Premier Division saw Truro become the first ever Cornish Club to win promotion to the Southern League football. As a bonus, the reserve side went through the season undefeated and were promoted to the South West Peninsula League. And the third team,

consisting mainly of under 20s, won promotion to the first division of the Falmouth/Helston League.

In 2008/09, Truro were promoted to the Southern League Premier Division as Champions, in the process equalling the British record with four successive promotions. In 2009/10, the Club finished a very creditable 11th in the first year at this new level.

2010-11 was another momentous season. Vying with favourites Salisbury City for top league spot for most of the season, Truro were finally crowned Champions by four points after a fabulous 6-0 win away at Salisbury. Seven straight victories at the end of the season assured Blue Square Bet Conference South football for the first time. A new British record was set in the process as no senior club had previously won 5 promotions in 6 seasons.

Season 2011/12 was a year of consolidation, with a 14th place finish in the club's first season of Conference football. Progress in 2012/13 was very difficult thanks to a 10-point deduction and a League transfer embargo as the club encountered financial problems. The club's very survival was in doubt until October 2012 and the last-minute intervention of two local businessmen. Truro were relegated at the end of the season, but lucky to be alive and kicking after recent traumas.

The Club gained promotion to the newly re-named National League South in 2014/15 via the play offs. Two 1-0 victories, over Hungerford in the semi final and St Neots Town at Treyew Road, in the final saw the club return to the second tier of non-league football for the second time.

After a tentative start to the 2015-16 season, Truro gradually climbed the National League South table, surpassing all expectations to finish fourth in a play-off place. However, City came up against a well-drilled Maidstone United side in the play-off semi-final, losing 3-0 on aggregate over the two legs.

The club struggled in the lower reaches of the table in 2016/17 but there was an upturn in fortunes last season as the club reached the first-round proper of the FA Cup for the first time, where we were rewarded with a trip to Charlton Athletic.

We also found ourselves amongst the leading pack throughout the campaign before losing in the play-offs.

The eve of the 2018/19 season saw us move from our Treyew Road home to ground-share with Torquay United until the Stadium For Cornwall is ready.

In June 2019, the Club was sold to the Cornish Pirates, via a business transfer under an asset deal. This wiped the historical slate clean, heralding the start of an exciting new era.

The Cornish Pirates are a professional rugby team, who have played in the English Championship, the league below the Premiership, since 2002.

The Pirates engaged the highly experienced Alex Black as their football consultant to lead the acquisition and he remains in this role.

Colin Groves (NZ) and Rebecca Thomas, Directors of the Cornish Pirates along with cricket legend Jack Richards form the new Board. With club stalwart Deba Sidhu stepping up into the key role of Club Secretary.

JAMES HAMON (Goalkeeper)

The 24-year-old keeper joined in the summer of 2019 after impressing in preseason. The Guernsey-born goalkeeper has previously been on the books of the likes of Exeter City and Gloucester City and comes to City with an impressive pedigree. James made 37 appearances during six years at St James Park before joining the White Tigers last summer. He was a key performer for Truro in the 2019/20 season and agreed a new deal with the club in April 2020.

JAMIE RICHARDS (Defender)

A versatile performer with higher level experience who joined the club during the course of 2015/16 following his release by Torquay United. He started his career at Southend United, where he emerged through the ranks before going on to serve the likes of Plymouth Argyle, Weymouth and Northern Irish outfit, Linfield. He has now made over 150 appearances for the club and is entering his fifth season with the club. He was named club captain after the departure of Ben Gerring in the summer of 2018. The defender now begins his 6th season with the club.

ED PALMER (Defender)

The commanding centre half has had a number of successful previous spells with the White Tigers including playing integral roles in our 2015 Play Off win as well being part of our historic FA Cup First Round squad. He re-joined the White Tigers in October 2019 following his departure from Taunton Town.

NIALL THOMPSON (Defender)

The versatile winger/full back is a popular figure whose former clubs include Hucknall Town, Sheffield FC, Micklegate Sports and Torquay United, from where he was loaned to The White Tigers in 2014/15. Niall was part of our record-breaking FA Cup first round squad in 2017 and has played anywhere from striker to right-back. Going into his fifth full season with the White Tigers, he agreed a new deal in the summer.

RUEBEN COLLINS (Defender)

Young defender Reuben Collins signed for the White Tigers on the opening day of the 2020/21 campaign following his release from AFC Wimbledon. The powerful defender who has previously had loan spells with Basingstoke Town, Merstham and Billericay Town was named Wimbledon's Academy Player of the Year in 2019 but was unfortunately released in 2020. Paul Wotton swiftly moved in to secure his services for the season in September.

CONNOR RILEY-LOWE (Defender)

Riley-Lowe started his career with League Two side Exeter City, where he came through the club's academy before signing his first professional contract with the Grecians in 2014. He ended up making 14 first team appearances for the club, in between having two highly successful loan spells in Cornwall with Truro. Following his release from the Devon side, he was quickly snapped up by the White Tigers on a permanent basis in the summer of 2017 where he starred across two



campaigns and was named Player of the Year on both occasions before deciding to leave to join Bath City in 2019. He returns to Treyew Road after a year away following his release from the Somerset side.

RYAN BRETT (Defender)

Midfielder Ryan Brett joined fellow midfielder Shane White in making the switch back to Treyew Road this summer from Taunton Town. He started his career with Plymouth Argyle before enduring success with Salisbury City. He spent three seasons with Truro before joining Taunton in 2017. He returned to Truro this summer.

RYAN DICKSON (Midfield)

The 32-year-old Cornish born player has represented a host of Football League clubs including Plymouth Argyle, Brentford, Southampton, Colchester United, Crawley Town and Yeovil Town. He spent the majority of last season on loan with us from Torquay and has signed on a permanent basis following his release from the Devon club.

DAN ROONEY (Midfield)

Dan, the younger brother of White Tiger's striker Louis Rooney, has played for Truro before on loan from Plymouth Argyle in 2018. A skilful and exciting player, Dan was quickly snapped up by Paul Wotton following his departure from Bath City who he spent a month with following a brief spell with Bury after his release from Plymouth Argyle.

SHANE WHITE (Midfielder)

The versatile player can operate across the back or in midfield re-joins the White Tigers after 4 years away with Taunton Town, where he starred for the Peacocks in their FA Cup

First Round run as well as their promotion to the Southern League. He originally joined the club on loan in 2008 from Plymouth Argyle before signing permanently in 2013 and had 3 incredibly successful seasons with us before joining the Somerset outfit. He scored the goal that saw us promoted back to the National League South in 2015 in a 1-0 home win over St Neots Town.

RIO GARSIDE (Midfield)

Former Plymouth Argyle academy player Rio Garside joined the club in the summer of 2019 after impressing in a trial game against his former side. The hardworking and technically gifted midfielder played a number of times for the Argyle reserve team in the South West Peninsula League in 2018/19 and joined us following his release from the Pilgrims in May 2019. The skilful youngster showed his talent and ability across midfield last season for the White Tigers is looking to kick on in 2020/21.

GEORGE TUCKER (Midfield)

Truro born midfielder George Tucker became the club's fifth signing of the summer arriving from South West Peninsula League side St Austell. The Cornishman came through the Plymouth Argyle academy before joining St Austell. He trained with us last season and played a few Southern League Cup games where he impressed prompting Paul Wotton to sign him permanently.

ANDREW 'ROCKY' NEAL (Striker)

Rocky Neal returned to the White Tigers this summer following his departure from Taunton Town. Having scored 60 goals for Bodmin Town, the striker joined Truro in 2016 where he endured two successful seasons before departing in 2018 to join the Somerset club. He netted 36 goals in his debut season for the Peacocks before hitting a further 16 last season. A top goal scorer who will be looking for more of the same with the White Tigers this campaign.

LOUIS ROONEY (Striker)

The talented frontman returned to the club in the summer of 2018 having previously had a loan spell in 2016/17. The Northern Ireland International came through the ranks at Plymouth Argyle before serving Linfield. Louis also scored the winning goal against St Albans on our return to Treyew Road in January 2019. He struggled with injuries last season but is looking to bounce back after a successful surgery.

TYLER HARVEY (Striker)

The livewire front-man re-joined club after briefly leaving for Bath City in September 2019. Having come through the ranks at Plymouth Argyle the striker made 50 appearances for the Pilgrims before joining Wrexham. He joined the White Tigers in 2017 and has scored some important goals including one at Charlton Athletic in the FA Cup. He scored 25 goals in the National League South before 20 in the Southern League last season so is a real goal threat.

ALEX BATTLE (Striker)

Alex begins his first full season with us this year after joining us on a permanent deal in

September 2019 following his release from Plymouth Argyle. The hardworking 21-year-old striker originally joined us on loan in 2018 and impressed so was no surprise when manager Paul Wotton made the move permanent last season.

STEWART YETTTON (Striker)

Affectionately known as "Yeti", an absolute City Club legend. Originally from across the Tamar and Plymouth where he began his career in 2003 with Argyle. He first joined City in 2005 and became a prolific goal scorer with 200 goals by early 2010. In the 2006-07 season he scored he scored 72 goals including 6 in one match. In 2013 he joined Weymouth then having spells with Plymouth Parkway and Tiverton Town, but he was never far away from City and at the start of the 2019-20 season, Yeti once again re-joined City as player and assistant manager.

KIERAN HAYES (Striker)

21-year-old striker Kieran Hayes joined the White Tigers in September 2020 following his release from boyhood club Nottingham Forest. Having been at the City Ground for 12 years going through their academy and youth systems, Kieran shined for the U23s over recent years before departing the club in the summer of 2020. The natural finisher spent a brief loan spell with us last season and now joins us on a permanent deal.

HERE WE go again. This week, Boris Johnson urged people to go back to the cinemas following the sad decision of Cineworld to temporarily close its 127 theatres across the UK, affecting 45,000 jobs.

It comes at the end of a damning week for the film industry with the launch of the forthcoming James Bond film No Time To Die being put back to 2021.

Sadly, it's an all-too familiar story in these strange Covid times, bearing a striking comparison to the football industry, which too has been left to pick up the pieces from the effects of the global pandemic.

So, the question remains then Boris, if you are pleading with people to go back to watching films in the cinema - a small, enclosed arena with very little room for manoeuvre or ventilation - then why can't fans return to football in a much larger, outdoor, socially-distanced environment?

Last Saturday, 15 Vue Cinemas - Cineworld's main market rival - showed live Premier League matches, well attended by fans. How can you watch football in a cinema but not an open-air stadium? That's madness.

Quite frankly, I'm amazed - and mightily relieved - that more proud, well-established football clubs haven't fallen foul to these testing Covid times and credit for that lies with the people who work tirelessly - usually without financial reward - to keep our clubs alive.

But, with a second Coronavirus wave threatening to kick in and tougher restrictions gradually being put in place, there comes a point when something has to give, as Cineworld have shown.

Last week's £10m Government bailout to the National League at least papers over the cracks for a few months but, at the time of writing this, clubs are still waiting for news of their reimbursements almost a week on and with their season already underway.

Indeed, poor communication throughout has been a huge issue during this uncertain summer and that's something that needs to be addressed in any future Covid post mortem.

Personally, I'm still dismayed by a lack of assistance, and greed sometimes, of the mega-rich Premier League and its member clubs during this crisis.

No fewer than six players in Gareth Southgate's England squad for this week's friendly with Wales and Nations League games against Belgium and Denmark boast a Non-League background. Doesn't that show that football at this level is impacting higher up the Pyramid?

In the week when Macclesfield Town were wound up by the High Court for debts totalling £500,000, Chelsea were spending £22 million for a replacement goalkeeper.

A couple of weeks later, Arsenal then opted to severely damage their once proud community ties by dumping its much-loved mascot Gunnersaurus - for the sake of £120-a-week - before then spending £45 million on Thomas Partey.

Obviously, I'm not suggesting bailouts of those proportions but what a gesture it would be from the 20 Premier League clubs if they put aside, say, £1 million each, to strengthen their community ties when it is needed most and keep their local clubs alive?

CYGNET HEALTHCARE STADIUM REGULATIONS

8. Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discriminatory, offensive or threatening gestures.
9. Persons must not damage or deface Club and Stadium property.
10. Persons must not damage, deface or obstruct any notice or advertisement.
11. Alcohol must not be brought into the stadium.
12. Persons must not consume alcohol that has not been purchased at Taunton Town FC.
13. Persons must not consume alcohol in any alcohol free designated areas.
14. There will be zero tolerance to alcohol abuse/misuse.
15. There will be zero tolerance to drug possession, use and abuse.
16. Smoking is permitted in the stadium except in areas designated as a No Smoking area.
17. Umbrellas are permitted within the stadium but must not be used if obstructing the view of other spectators.

Spectators must also note the following:

- A) The Club does not accept any responsibility or liability whatsoever for any loss or damage to vehicles or their contents, or any other personal property brought onto the Clubs premises and stadium.
- B) The Club is unable to accept any additional responsibility for minors attending matches beyond those matters covered by the Stadium Regulations.
- C) Photography and use of video including CCTV is in operation at all matches and events and may be used in any of our media channels as well as press releases.
- D) Dogs on a lead are permitted in the Stadium but they remain the sole responsibility of their owner at all times.
