# METROPOLITAN POLICE

On 6th July 1829, Sir Robert Peel formed the Metropolitan Police, the first organised Police Force in the world, with an office overlooking the Thames at Whitehall known as Scotland Yard, a name that has become famous throughout the world, and also became synonymous with the Metropolitan Police.

Ninety years later, in 1919, the Metropolitan Police Football Club was formed, playing friendly matches until joining the Spartan League in 1928. Apart from the war years (1939-45), the club remained in that competition until 1960. During that time the Blues were League Champions eight times, runners-up once and League Cup winners once. In 1960 the Blues joined the Metropolitan League, winning the League Cup in 1969.

In 1971 the Blues were accepted into the Southern League and played in Division South until 1977, under Team Manager Vic Rouse, the former Wales and Crystal Palace goalkeeper.

In 1977, the Blues moved to the Isthmian League, becoming one of the founder members of the restructured Division Two. A successful first season (1977/78) resulted in the club finishing runners-up to Epsom & Ewell and being promoted to Division One. In

Season 1981/82 the club finished 3rd in Division One, missing promotion by just two points.

However, fortunes changed and in 1984/5, as a result of finishing third from the bottom, the Blues were relegated to Division Two (South). Ironically, in that 1984/5 season the Blues enjoyed their best run in the F.A. Cup, reaching the First Round Proper. The home tie against Dartford was subsequently featured on the BBC's "Match of the Day" programme. Defeat against Dartford was followed by a run of defeats in the league, which saw the Blues drop into one of the four relegation places introduced that season.

On returning to Division Two (South) the Blues finished 7th in both 1985/6 and 1986/7. During 1987/88 the Blues led the Division Two (South) table in January by seven points but they were overhauled by Chalfont St Peter, who won their last two games of season and became champions by just one point. The Blues were runners-up by virtue of a one-goal difference over Dorking. It was a nail-biting finish to a season in which the Blues lost just two league matches, both away.

The next two seasons saw the club finish in mid-table in Division One but in 1990/1 the





club finished second from bottom and were relegated into the newly formed Division Two of the restructured Diadora (Isthmian) League. The club remained in Division Two for several years, always finishing in the top half but just outside the promotion positions. In 1993/4 the Blues again reached the First Round Proper of the F.A. Cup, losing 2:0 to Crawley Town.

Season 1994/5 saw the club celebrate its 75th Anniversary with a game against the Army and the opening of a new grandstand at Imber Court. The Blues finished in 5th position in Division Two and ended the season with a thrilling victory in the Carlsberg Trophy, defeating Collier Row in a penalty shoot-out following a 1:1 draw after extra-time.

During the next few seasons the club continued to finish in the top half of Division Two and in 1999/2000 reached the 5<sup>th</sup> Round of the F.A. Vase (last 8), losing to the eventual winners Deal Town.

In 2002/3 the Ryman League was restructured and the Blues were placed in Division One South. That season the club finished second from bottom and faced the prospect of relegation. By a stroke of good fortune, only three teams were relegated from Divisions One North and South, therefore, we found ourselves in a relegation play-off against Wembley who finished second from bottom in Division One North. Fortunately, we won both legs of the play-off and retained our

place in Division One South. Another poor season in 2003/4 saw us finished just above the relegation places in 20<sup>th</sup> position.

Following the F.A. restructuring of the non-league pyramid, in 2004/5 we found ourselves in the Ryman League Division One. In their first full season in charge, the new management team of Jim Cooper, assisted by Gavin MacPherson and John Nicholson, had an immediate impact and we finished 5<sup>th</sup> in the Division One, thus qualifying for the play-offs (introduced as part of the F.A. restructuring) where we played Bromley. An evenly balanced encounter ended with the scores 1:1 after extra time but we lost 4:3 in the penalty shoot-out.

In 2005/6 we finished in 4<sup>th</sup> position in the Ryman Division One but again fell at the play-off semi-final stage, losing 1:0 to Dover Athletic.

Further F. A. restructuring resulted in a Ryman League Division 1 North and Division 1 South in 2006/7 and the club finished in sixth position in the Division 1 South. With only one club promoted automatically, the club narrowly missed out on a play-off place. However, the club reached the final of the Surrey Senior Cup for the first time since 1933 but was beaten 4-1 after extra time by Tooting & Mitcham United, the score after 90 minutes was 1-1.

In 2007/8 the Blues finished 4<sup>th</sup> in the Ryman League Division 1 South but for the third time in four years was beaten in the play-off semi final, this time 2-0 by Cray Wanderers.

In 2008/9 the club again finished in 4<sup>th</sup> position in the Ryman Division One South, thus qualifying for the play offs for the 4<sup>th</sup> time in 5

seasons, winning the semi final play off match 1:0 against Fleet Town, but losing 0:1 to Cray Wanderers in the final.

In 2009/10 MPFC had a disappointing Ryman Division 1 South league campaign. After a poor start the club was never in a position to mount a serious challenge for a play off position and finished in 10<sup>th</sup> position. However, this disappointment was off-set by winning the London Senior Cup for the first time in the club's history, beating AFC Wimbledon in an exciting final, 4:3 on penalties, after the match ended 4:4 after extra time.

The 2010/11 season proved to be the most exciting in the club's history, culminating in the club winning the Ryman League Division 1 South Championship by the narrow margin of one goal. Bognor Regis Town had a 2 point advantage during the latter stages of the season and that was the situation when the clubs lined up for the final match. Bognor were held to an unexpected draw by Chatham Town and with the Met managing to scramble a 1:0 win against Merstham, it was enough to win the title with a goal difference of 61 against Bognor's 60.

So, for the first time in the club's history it competed in the Ryman League Premier Division during the 2011/12 Season. The club got off to a flying start and at Christmas found themselves in 4<sup>th</sup> position but unfortunately fell away in the second half of the season and finished in 12<sup>th</sup> position.

The 2012/13 Season proved to be the most successful in the clubs history at that stage, finishing in 6<sup>th</sup> position in the Ryman League Premier Division, missing out on a play-off place on goal difference (9 goals). The club

had a good run in the F.A. Cup, reaching the First Round Proper, eventually losing 2:1 to Crawley Town from League One of the Football League.

The 2013/14 Season was less successful in respect of the Ryman League Premier Division in that we spent much of the season in mid-table, eventually finishing in 17th position. Although we were knocked out of the FA Cup and FA Trophy at an early stage, we reached the final of the London Senior Cup and Surrey Senior Cup.

The 2014/15 Season ended with us reaching the Ryman League Premier Division playoffs, albeit, via an unusually set of circumstances. We actually finished in 6th position in the Premier Division but after a protracted series of appeals, Enfield Town were deducted 3 points and we ended up in 5th position. Unfortunately, we lost the playoff semi final 2:1 to Hendon. However, we enjoyed success in the Surrey Senior Cup, beating Merstham 2:0 in the final.

In 2015/16 we finished in 12<sup>th</sup> position. We had mixed fortunes in the cup competitions, falling at the first hurdle in the FA Cup after a reply with Sittingbourne and the first Round of the London Senior Cup to London Bari on penalties. We fared marginally better by reaching the 2<sup>nd</sup> round of the Ryman League Cup and the 3<sup>rd</sup> round of the Surrey Senior Cup before losing to Tooting & Mitcham and Molesey respectively. We had a decent run in the FA Trophy losing eventually in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Qualifying round to a good Wealdstone side after beating AFC Hornchurch and Canvey Island in previous rounds.

The 2016/17 season was one of mixed emotions and ups and downs. The 1<sup>st</sup> X1

struggled with form and consistency which resulted in a relegation battle that went to the last game of the season.

The 2017/18 season was again one of mixed emotions with the 1<sup>st</sup> X1 in the hunt for play off places for the majority of the season before falling away and finishing 10<sup>th</sup>. We reached the final of the Bostik League Cup where we lost 5-3 to Billericay Town aet.

In the 2018/19 season due to FA restructuring we were moved from the Bostik league to the Southern League which led to the departure of our long serving manager Jim Cooper, a number of players and also greatly increased travelling costs. Gavin Macpherson was appointed manager with Jon Nurse as his assistant and they gave youth a chance which they took with both hands playing outstanding football and commitment to finish 3<sup>rd</sup> in the league and then beating Salisbury and Poole Town in the play offs. We then had to play a super play off final against Tonbridge Angels winners of the Bostik league play off for promotion to the National league South, Unfortunately we lost 3-2 aet. We had a tremendous run in the FA Cup reaching the 1<sup>st</sup> Round proper where we lost to AFC Newport County of League 2. We won the Surrey Senior Cup beating Tooting and Mitcham 2-0 in the final.

In the season 2019/20 we lost some important players from last season amongst them Nesta Guinness-Walker signed for Wimbledon, Bertie Schotterl returned to Germany, Ethan Chislett signed for Aldershot, Max Blackmore returned to Wesfield. Despite this setback we were sitting comfortably in mid table when the season was ended by the Covid 19 pandemic.



# MEET THE VISITORS

### **RHYS FORSTER** (Goalkeeper)

Extremely promising young goalkeeper signed in October 2019 from CB Hounslow United. Rhys has previously been at AFC Bournemouth where he was unlucky not to earn a professional contract. Has a reputation for saving penalties.

### **LEE AXWORTHY** (Goalkeeper)

A product of the Brentford's scholarship programme, Lee was snapped up in February 2020 from Holmer Green.

### **OLIVER ROBINSON** (Centre Back)

Ollie is in his fifth season in a Blue shirt. Made club captain in July 2019, a commanding centre half who has previously played for Walton Casuals and Molesey.

### **SIMBA KUDYIWA** (Centre Back)

A summer signing from Aldershot, the teenage centre back has looked composed during pre-season and will be pushing to cement a first team spot this season.

### **ALEX FISHER** (Left Back)

Joined the Met from Ashford Town in June 2018. The former QPR youngster was a major part of the successful 2018/2019 campaign helping win the play offs and the Surrey Senior Cup and continues to improve season upon season.

### **ZAC CHISLETT** (Right Back)

Another graduate of the successful youth system at Imber Court, Zac broke in to the first team during the 19/20 season with a

string of impressive displays. The teenager is younger brother of ex Met and current AFC Wimbledon midfielder Ethan Chislett.

### **JUNIOR ELDSTAL** (Defense/Midfield)

Malaysian-Swedish footballer started his career with Aldershot Town before moving abroad to play for Johor Darul Ta'zim F.C and went on to represent the Malaysian National team having 20 international caps. Junior has actually played against Messi. Joined the Met in February 2019.

### **LUKE ROBERTSON** (Central Midfield)

Came through the youth team ranks at the Met and was part of the famous FA youth cup team that eventually lost at Wolves. After a brief move to Farnborough, Robbo returned to Imber Court in October 2018 and was a major part of the team that won the Southern League play off in May 2019.

### **RUDY APPAIH-ALLEN** (Central Midfield)

Another graduate of the successful U18 team. Defensive minded midfielder who has played a wide range of positions making him Mister Versatility.

### **LOUIS BIRCH** (Central Midfield)

A tough tackling midfielder who was part of the club's very successful reserves. Now a massive part of the 1st team who can also fit in to the back four when required.

### **SAMMY De SAINT CROIX** (Wide Midfield)

A pre-season signing from Frimley Green. Started at Aldershot before spending



several years playing out in the New Zealand Premier League with Hawke's Bay & North Shore United among others.

**OLIVER KNIGHT** (Wide Midfield)

An attacking midfielder who joined the club at the start of the 2018/2019 season from Frome Town. His previous clubs are Forest Green Rovers and Cirencester Town. Played a massive part in the successful 2018/2019 season.

**KAI HAMILTON** (Wide Midfield)

A former Reading and Colchester trialist, Kai is a quick direct winger. Signed from CB Hounslow in July 2019 Kai quickly impressed and has gone on to establish himself as regular member of the side.

**GEORGE FRITH** (Midfielder)

A marauding midfielder who is on his second stint at Imber Court having returned in December 2019 from Westfield. George previously played for Slough Town before injury kept him side-lined for the 2017/18 season.

**JACK MAZZONE** (Forward)

Mazza joined the Met in June 2018 having previously played for Woking, Hendon and South Park. Known for the spectacular, Jack has been the clubs top scorer for the past 2 seasons and will play a pivotal role leading the forward line.

**MAX BLACKMORE** (Forward)

A prolific front man, Max returns to Imber Court after a season away at Westfield where he was the clubs leading scorer in 19/20, scoring 19 in 24 league games.

**TOM CURSONS** (Striker)

A product of the Academy system, Tom broke in to the first team picture last season and will be pushing for a starting berth in 20/21.

**GAVIN MacPHERSON** (Manager)

Appointed as manager at the start of 2018/2019 season following the resignation of Jim Cooper. Gavin has been with the club for a number of years as a player, and Jim's assistant for over 12 years. Regarded by his peers and many players as a fantastic, innovative coach. Previously as a player, was a professional footballer at Barnet and Carlisle, played on loan at Wealdstone, Slough Town and Woking.

**JON NURSE** (Assistant Manager)

An Ex professional and International footballer who has now turned his hand to coaching. Having won the FA Trophy, the National League and League 2 playoffs as a player he has now won National League and Southern League playoffs as a coach. Has been with the Met 4 years and is an integral part of the Management Team.

The international break very rarely affects Non-League clubs, but Non-League is increasingly influencing the international scene.

Each season we see more players deservedly earn moves into the Football League – and some even go on to reach the absolute peak.

Over the last seven months the football pyramid has become even more divided, with 'Project Big Picture' now trying hard to increase the gap, but the importance of lower-league clubs to the product on the pitch has never been more obvious.

Six players in Gareth Southgate's latest England squad have had stints in Non-League and there were five in the side Ryan Giggs picked for Wales when the two teams met last week.

Nick Pope started the friendly fixture at Wembley having begun his career in the Eastern Counties League with Team Bury before progressing to Bury Town in the Isthmian League.

Following his move to Charlton Athletic, Pope went on loan to Harrow Borough, Welling United, Cambridge United and Aldershot Town for more crucial experience of first team football.

The back-up England keepers against Wales, Jordan Pickford and Dean Henderson, are also no strangers to Non-League. Pickford had loan spells at Darlington and Alfreton Town while Henderson played in goal for Stockport County just over four years ago when they were in National League North. He's also pushing to become Manchester United's number one.

Centre-back Tyrone Mings impressed in senior football at Yate Town and Chippenham Town in the Southern League before a successful trial at Ipswich Town forged the start of his top-flight career.

Dominic Calvert-Lewin made his England debut, and scored, in the 3-0 win over Wales. A debut goal was nothing new to the Everton striker, as a 17-year-old he bagged on his first appearance for Stalybridge Celtic against Hyde on Boxing Day when Sheffield United sent him out for game time. On New Year's Day, in the reverse fixture, he scored twice and set up three.

Danny Ings also got in on the act at Wembley, scoring his first goal for his country via a bicycle kick. Ten years ago, he was netting in Non-League at Dorchester Town on loan from Bournemouth.

Many others in the England squad either started or showed their talents in the lower reaches of the Football League before stepping up into the Premier League spotlight.

Non-League football and its clubs play a vital role in developing players just as much as the top-flight academies – every player has a different path and their roots should not be forgotten.

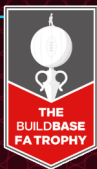

# CYGNET HEALTHCARE STADIUM REGULATIONS

7. Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discriminatory, offensive or threatening language.
8. Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discriminatory, offensive or threatening gestures.
9. Persons must not damage or deface Club and Stadium property.
10. Persons must not damage, deface or obstruct any notice or advertisement.
11. Alcohol must not be brought into the stadium.
12. Persons must not consume alcohol that has not been purchased at Taunton Town FC.
13. Persons must not consume alcohol in any alcohol free designated areas.
14. There will be zero tolerance to alcohol abuse/misuse.
15. There will be zero tolerance to drug possession, use and abuse.
16. Smoking is permitted in the stadium except in areas designated as a No Smoking area.
17. Umbrellas are permitted within the stadium but must not be used if obstructing the view of other spectators.

Spectators must also note the following:

- A) The Club does not accept any responsibility or liability whatsoever for any loss or damage to vehicles or their contents, or any other personal property brought onto the Clubs premises and stadium.
- B) The Club is unable to accept any additional responsibility for minors attending matches beyond those matters covered by the Stadium Regulations.
- C) Photography and use of video including CCTV is in operation at all matches and events and may be used in any of our media channels as well as press releases.
- D) Dogs on a lead are permitted in the Stadium but they remain the sole responsibility of their owner at all times.
