DORCHESTER TOWN

Founded in 1880, Dorchester Town Football Club participated in The Dorset League from 1896 to 1947, and The Western League between 1947 and 1972, before joining The Southern League, where they remained until gaining entry into the newly formed Football Conference South in 2004. They were relegated back into The Southern League in 2014.

The Magpies won the Championship of The Dorset League in 1937/38, and the Championship of The Western League in 1954/55.

After joining The Southern League in 1972 the early years were a struggle, and it was not until season 1977/78 that the Club first tasted success, when they finished as runners up to Margate in Division One (South) and were promoted into The Premier Division. At the end of the following season, after a difficult campaign, The Alliance League (now the Conference) was formed, and The Magpies found themselves back in the reformed Southern Division.

Dorchester then celebrated their centenary by winning the Championship of Division One (South) in 1979/80, by a one-point margin over Aylesbury. Relegated from The Premier Division at the end of the 1983/84 season,

following a severe financial crisis, they only just avoided dropping out of the League in season 1985/86. However, a remarkable transformation was achieved, and Dorchester returned to The Premier Division as Champions at the end of the following season.

For most of the seasons that they were back in The Premier Division, Dorchester were a mid-table team but season 1997/98 saw The Magpies achieve their highest ever Premier Division placing when they finished in fourth place, but the next two seasons were very disappointing, with relegation only just being avoided on both occasions and in 2001 The Magpies lost The Premier Division place that they had held for fourteen seasons. The Magpies threatened to regain their Premier Division status in their first season in The Eastern Division, but finished in third place behind Champions Hastings Town and Runners Up Grantham Town, however they achieved their objective the following season, when after a fine campaign, with only five defeats, the Club returned to The Premier Division as Champions.

In season 2003/04 Dorchester won The Southern League end of season play off competition, defeating Bath City in the Semi-Final and Tiverton Town in the Final, played at



Exeter City's St. James Park, to gain entry to the newly formed Conference South. Following their elevation to the Conference regional division, apart from the first two, and seasons 2011/12 and 2012/13, they invariably struggled in the lower half of the table, but in season 2012/13 The Magpies finished in their highest position, when they attained eighth place, which was a great achievement for the small market town of Dorchester with a population of 15,000. Sadly season 2013/14 was a nightmare campaign, and The Magpies finished rock bottom, and were relegated back into The Southern League Premier Division, where they initially struggled to "stop the rot", but results improved following a managerial change at the turn of the year, and Dorchester ended the season safe from the threat of another relegation in seventeenth place in the final

league table. The Magpies position in The SPL was consolidated in season 2015/16 when they finished in thirteenth position. Season 2016/17 was another difficult season, and relegation was just avoided with a draw on the last day of the season, and the following season they finished in nineteenth position, comfortably avoiding any relegation threat, whilst in season 2018/19 The Magpies ended the season in a comfortable fifteenth place. Last season saw a season long battle to avoid the relegation zone, but eventually almost certain relegation was avoided only when it was decided to null and void the campaign due to the advent of Covid 19.

The Magpies have enjoyed significant success in cup competitions over the years, and have reached The Second Round Proper of the FA Cup on four occasions, including

the fine achievement in season 2012 – 13 when they eliminated Sky Bet League Two side Plymouth Argyle in The First Round Proper at The Avenue Stadium, a game which was televised live on ESPN, and the first time The Magpies had eliminated a Football League side. However, they were then knocked out in the next round by Luton Town at Kenilworth Road. The most recent run to The Second Round Proper, prior to 2012, was in 1981, when they lost to AFC Bournemouth after a replay, before a crowd of 8700 at Dean Court. Previously they had played York City and Plymouth Argyle, at that same stage of the competition, both in the 1950's. They have also reached The First Round Proper on six other occasions, with their opponents being Norwich City, QPR, and Port Vale, again all in the 1950's, Gloucester City in 1989 - 90, Oxford United in 1995 - 96, and finally in 2000 - 01 when Wigan Athletic were the opposition at The JJB Stadium, when The Magpies went down 3-1 after a fine display.

In the FA Trophy The Magpies have twice reached the last sixteen, firstly in 1971 - 72 when they lost to the holders Telford United after a replay, and then again in 1996 - 97 losing to eventual winners Woking.

The Magpies, then in the Eastern Division, won the Southern League Cup competition in season 2001 - 02, convincingly defeating then Premier Division King's Lynn by an aggregate score of 4-0 in the two leg Final. Prior to that Dorchester's most successful season in that competition was 1991 - 92 when they finished as runners up to Dover Athletic. Previously they reached the semi-finals in 1981 - 82 when they lost to Wealdstone, and they reached the same stage again in 1998 - 99 when they were defeated by Cambridge City.

Dorchester have won the Dorset Senior Cup on twelve occasions, the most recent being season 2011 - 2012 when Wimborne Town were beaten in the Final.

Dorchester moved to their current ground, The Avenue Stadium in August 1990, which is literally a few yards down the road from their old home. The ground stands on land owned by the Duchy of Cornwall, and Prince Charles, in his role as Duke of Cornwall, took an active interest in its design, making a number of private visits during construction, before officially opening the ground on the 20th November 1991.

In May 2013 Chairman Shaun Hearn transferred half of his majority shareholding in the club to the Community Trust, with the commitment to see D.T.F.C become fully community owned, a process which was duly completed. This has introduced an entirely new business model to the club, which now needs to run in a sustainable manner in order to protect its long-term future. This is a daunting, but exciting, venture, which should bring long-term benefits to both the club and the wider community as they become more closely involved with each other. Supporters can now have a real say in how D.T.F.C. is run by the new Board of Directors, for the first time in its history it is truly OUR club.

During the close season in 2018, a 3G pitch was laid, which has opened up new avenues, and which has increased the community involvement in the club, with the facility being used on most days and evenings during the week. A significant uplift for the club for the future.

MEET THE VISITORS

WILL BUSE (Goalkeeper)

Will has joined The Magpies on a season long loan from parent club Bristol City, having signed his first professional contract with The Robins, and having progressed from City's U18's to U23's. Also, Will has worked with manager Leigh Robinson previously. Age 19.

JOSIAH DUNSTAN (Defender)

Josiah, who is a centre back, joined The Magpies during the summer, having previously spent a period at The Hartpury College Academy, and has also appeared for Hungerford Town and Taunton Town. Age 19.

JOEL KIWOBO (Defender)

Joel, a strong physical defender, has joined The Magpies, having previously played in Portugal, Italy and his native France for Olympique St. Quentin, Rodeo and Maura. Age 24.

CHARLIE MADDEN (Defender)

Charlie, who can play either as a central defender or central midfield, has now signed for The Magpies, having initially joined them on loan from Weston-super-Mare in January. Charlie began his career as a scholar at Exeter City, but left in 2015, and joined American university Franklin Pierce in New Hampshire for four years before signing for Weston super Mare in 2019. Age 23.

OAKLEY HANGER (Defender)

Oakley, who can play either a full back or central defence, has returned to the club, having initially made his first team debut for

The Magpies in August 2014, after progression from the club's reserve team. He went on to make 68 first team appearances, and scored two goals before leaving the club in April 2016 to travel to The USA where he completed a four-year scholarship. Oakley also played at schoolboy and youth level with Yeovil Town. Age 24.

HARRY HODGES (Defender)

Harry, is a versatile defender, who joined The Magpies in the summer, can play at right-back or centre-back, and can also play in centre-midfield. Harry was a youth player at Plymouth Argyle, and subsequently joined Bristol Rovers, and also spent a loan period with Gloucester City. Age 20.

ASHLEY WELLS (Defender)

Ashley is a versatile, skillful defender who can play anywhere across the back line, and he has re-joined The Magpies, and has been made captain, having played for us last season on a dual registration basis from neighbours Weymouth, with whom he had made over 300 appearances. Ashley has also played for Portland United. Age 29.

TIAGO MARQUES SA (Defender)

Tiago, who is a versatile defender, initially joined The Magpies on a short-term loan from his parent club Weymouth in September 2018, before joining the club on a permanent basis prior to last season. Age 22.



SAM BAYSTON (Midfielder)

Sam is a wide midfield player, who relishes the opportunity to get forward whenever the opportunity presents. Sam has been with local rivals Wimborne Town for the majority of the past five seasons, and has also had spells with Hamworthy United, New Milton Town and Poole Town. Sam had a decent goalscoring and goal assist record with Wimborne last season, and is a player who works hard off the ball. Born Poole. Age 26.

HARRY BURNS (Midfielder)

Harry, who is a creative midfield player, has joined The Magpies on a one-month loan from his parent club Weymouth. Age 18.

BILLY LOWES (Midfielder)

Billy is a hard-working midfielder who likes to get forward when the opportunity allows, and has re-signed for The Magpies for his fourth season with the club, having previously made well over a century of appearances, and having previously been with Weymouth. Billy also had spells in the academies at AFC Bournemouth and Yeovil Town, before he joined Poole Town where he won The Young Player of the Year award. Billy has also had loan spells with Wincanton Town and AFC Totton. Born Poole. Age. 23.

TOM BLAIR (Midfielder)

Tom is a versatile player, who can play in midfield or as an out-and-out attacker, and has now been with the club since the beginning of the 2016-17 season, and had made almost one hundred and fifty appearances at the commencement of the new campaign. Tom also spent time with The Southampton Academy from ages 8-11, and he had also played for Bridport prior to

joining The Magpies. Born Dorchester. Age 20.

LEIGHTON THOMAS (Midfielder)

Leighton, a hard-working versatile player, has recently joined The Magpies, having previously played locally for Bridport and Street. Has also appeared for The Cayman Islands U20 National team.

TOM BATH (Striker)

Tom is a renowned striker. who joined The Magpies at the beginning of last season, having been with Tiverton Town for the previous three seasons, where he scored forty-five goals in one hundred and forty-three appearances. Tom, who has also previously played for South West Peninsula League side Alphington and Southern League South Division club Willand Rovers, scored twenty goals last season in thirty-eight appearances for The Magpies. Born Exeter. Age 26.

LAURENT DAVIS-WILSON (Striker)

Laurent has recently signed for The Magpies, having previously played for Frome Town and Yate Town. Laurent began his career at The Bristol Rovers Academy, and has also played in Sweden with FK Tonsberg and Torsby IF. Age 24.

EMILE KPAMA NGOY (Striker)

Emile initially joined The Magpies in late January, having spent time at Scottish League Two club Brechin City, and was previously with Welsh Premier League club

Llanelli. Emile has also had spells in Italy and Portugal. Age 23.

Rubin Wilson

Rubin has joined The Magpies on a three-month loan from his parent club Plymouth Argyle, having signed his first professional contract with The Pilgrims in the summer. Rubin has progressed through the youth ranks at Plymouth, and has been a regular goal scorer for The Pilgrims' U18 and Central League teams, and made his first team debut last season. Age 18.

THE MANAGEMENT TEAM

Manager: Leigh Robinson.

Leigh was appointed at the beginning of January 2020, and began his managerial career as Joint Manager of Wellington, and then Bridgwater Town, before being appointed as Manager of Taunton Town in August 2012, where he oversaw a successful spell, guiding The Peacocks to three successive Southern League Division One South & West Play-Offs, before finally winning The Championship in 2017-18, with over one hundred points, and just one defeat. He then became Manager at then National League South Truro City, where he improved results in a seven-month spell before leaving in March 2019. Age 39.

First Team Coach: Robbie Herrera.

Robbie joined The Magpies as the other half of a management duo with Leigh, having most recently been with Plymouth Argyle's Academy for two seasons as Professional Development Phase Lead Coach for seventeen to twenty-one-year olds. Robbie holds a UEFA A coaching licence, and has

also worked with Torquay United's youth team, before he spent two years as The Gulls' Assistant Manager. Robbie had also been an accomplished professional footballer, beginning his career as a youth player at Queens Park Rangers, before spells at Torquay United, Fulham and finally to Leyton Orient, making two hundred and seventy-six appearances in all. Robbie also had spells in non-league football with Merthyr Tydfil, Taunton Town and Bideford. Age 50.

Sports Therapist: Taylor Cornish

Taylor has joined the club, after having spent the past two years with Bridgwater Town, and has also worked with Taunton Town, while completing his BSc (Hons) Sport Therapy degree.

Goalkeeping Coach: Steve Dodge

Not surprisingly Steve was a goalkeeper in his playing days, and was a member of Eddie Belt's outstanding Magpies' Youth Team in the 1980's along with David West, and he also appeared in The Magpies' Southern League side. Steve also played for Weymouth, Swanage, Bashley, Christchurch, Hamworthy United, Portland United and Weymouth Sports. As a Police Officer Steve also played for the Dorset Police team for fifteen seasons, as well as their veterans' side, and in recent seasons has served as goalkeeping coach at Portland United before joining The Magpies. Age 55.

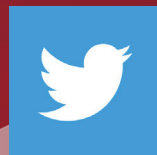

What's the best goal you've seen live? Not necessarily your favourite or one that meant the most, saw your club win something or, dare I say it, avoid relegation. But the best.

Football is subjective. One person's best goal might not be to the taste of another's. Some prefer mazy runs. Others think there's nothing better than a long range strike that crashes in off the underside of the bar.

We're fortunate we get to see more Non-League goals than we ever did. Now wonder strikes from across the country are only a few clicks away, be it on the club's website, YouTube channel or social media. Often we will see a goal just moments after the game has finished.

It used to be waiting to buy the end of season club video to re-live those moments that could have occurred months earlier. Was it quite as good as you remembered? Was it really that far out? Did the keeper really have no chance?

One that will always live long in my memory was a strike by Michael Warner for Farnborough Town against Heybridge Swifts. A headed clearance fell out of the sky to customary cries of 'SHOOT!'

Often the instruction to take aim is swiftly followed by groans as the ball sails off target, troubling parked vehicles in the car park more than the goalkeeper.

But this day, Warner's effort was a dream. Like a tracer missile the ball rocketed into the top corner. Two goalkeepers wouldn't have saved it.

It was brilliant. These days it would have gone 'viral' and been retweeted thousands of times on twitter.

Technology has certainly made our annual Goal of the Season at The NLP's National Game Awards more competitive than ever.

More and more nominations roll in each year, all worthy winners from all different levels of the game. In years gone by, these goals would be the stuff of myth and legend. Now the tangible proof is there.

I was fortunate enough to be at the National League North Eliminator game between Brackley Town and Gateshead a few months ago.

Fans weren't allowed in the grounds. That was a shame for loyal supporters as it is but even more so when Shane Byrne pulled a spectacular rabbit out of the hat on the stroke of half-time.

Gateshead had just gone one up deep in first-half stoppage time and looked for all the world to be heading into the break in front.

But Byrne, apparently, had other ideas. Receiving the ball from kick-off inside his own half, the midfielder hit an inch perfect ball that flew right into the top corner.

Gateshead keeper Brad James had no chance. It wasn't like he'd been caught unawares not concentrating.

It left the handful of people inside the ground open-mouthed. A wow moment. The only problem for me being, I didn't fully see it. I was taking notes down from the first goal. Who shoots direct from kick-off!? I saw it in the air from a long way out, I saw it arrow into the net. I saw 80 per cent of it. But I didn't see the actual strike itself.

So does it count as my best goal witnessed live? It's certainly the best one I nearly saw!

CYGNET HEALTHCARE STADIUM REGULATIONS

Persons entering this stadium must abide by the Stadium Regulations as printed in the matchday programme and displayed on posters inside the stadium. 6. Chanting or singing of an obscene, indecent, discriminatory or offensive nature is not permitted.
7. Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discriminatory, offensive or threatening language.
8. Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discriminatory, offensive or threatening gestures.
9. Persons must not damage or deface Club and Stadium property.
10. Persons must not damage, deface or obstruct any notice or advertisement.
11. Alcohol must not be brought into the stadium.
12. Persons must not consume alcohol that has not been purchased at Taunton Town FC.
13. Persons must not consume alcohol in any alcohol free designated areas.
14. There will be zero tolerance to alcohol abuse/misuse.
15. There will be zero tolerance to drug possession, use and abuse.
16. Smoking is permitted in the stadium except in areas designated as a No Smoking area.
17. Umbrellas are permitted within the stadium but must not be used if obstructing the view of other spectators.

Spectators must also note the following:

- A) The Club does not accept any responsibility or liability whatsoever for any loss or damage to vehicles or their contents, or any other personal property brought onto the Clubs premises and stadium.
- B) The Club is unable to accept any additional responsibility for minors attending matches beyond those matters covered by the Stadium Regulations.
- C) Photography and use of video including CCTV is in operation at all matches and events and may be used in any of our media channels as well as press releases.
- D) Dogs on a lead are permitted in the Stadium but they remain the sole responsibility of their owner at all times.
