

THE AWAY FND

Early days - Truro City Football Club was established in 1889, becoming a funder member of the CCFA, which came into being at a meeting at the Royal Hotel in Truro on 18th September of that year.

Other Clubs present at that meeting were Porthcurno, Penzance, Probus School, Liskeard, Dunheved School, Torpoint and Millbrook. Truro City's first recorded match was played at Truro College against Penzance on 4th October 1889, which they won 7 -1. Further games were played at Tolgarrick, adjacent to the existing Treyew Road ground and the club has also played at Kenwyn and Chapel Hill. A 5-0 victory over Launceston in 1895 brought the club's first trophy, the Cornwall Senior Cup, which Truro City has now won 15 times.

The club initially participated in the Plymouth & District League. In 1931 they achieved one of the finest run of results in club history, playing nine games in 15 days, winning eight and drawing one. However, the club left the league that same year, along with several other Cornish Clubs, after a dispute over payment of Devon Clubs' travelling expenses.

City joined the newly formed Cornwall Senior League, winning it in 1932 and 1933. However, disappointing gates in the new league saw City rejoining the Plymouth & District League in 1934 and won the title in 1937.

Departure from the Cornwall Senior League led to the club being barred from entering the Cornwall Senior Cup. The CCFA refused a proposal for the club's reserve team to enter the competition and City were only re-admitted 1938 (they won the Senior Cup in their first season back).



The club has also won the Durning Lawrence Charity Cup, which Truro City gave to the county, 11 times, the first in 1912 and the last in 1981.

The South Western and Combination League years - Truro City was one of the founder members of the South Western League, which was formed in 1951. However, the club did not meet with immediate success, having to seek re-election for the first two seasons. They have had to seek re-election twice more, in 1982 and 1983. Their first championship came in 1960/61 and they have been champions four times since: 1969/70. 1992/93. 1995/96 and 1997/98.

The South Western League Cup has come to Treyew Road on three occasions: 1959/60, 1966/67 and 1997/98. The League's Sporting Trophy was won in 1974/75 and 1988/89 and the Best Ground Trophy in 1995/96. City were forced to leave the South Western League at the end of the 1974/75 season as the Treyew Road ground had been part a road-widening scheme and it was 1978 before they were re-admitted.

The club won the Cornwall Combination League title in 1994/95, 1998/99, 2005/6 and 2007/8 and the Combination League Cup on nine occasions: 1968, 1978, 1987, 1988, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2005/6 and 2007/8. The Evely Cup has been won seven times: 1968, 1978, 1986, 1988, 1999, 2000 and 2005/06.

Promotion and a trip to Wembley - In late 2004, the club was acquired by a new owner and in 2005/06 the club ended the season as runners-up, winning promotion to the Toolstation Western League.

The 2006/07 season was the most successful in the Club's history: winning the Toolstation Western League First Division by a record margin at the first attempt, retaining the Cornwall Senior Cup and winning the FA Vase at the new Wembley Stadium with a 3-1 win over AFC Totton

The FA Vase campaign set two new benchmarks. It was the first time a club playing at Step 6 in the Football Pyramid had won the trophy and the final was watched by a record crowd of over 37,000.

Southern League - Success continued in 2007/08, as a 17 point winning margin in the Toolstation Western League Premier Division saw Truro become the first ever Cornish Club to win promotion to the Southern League football. As a bonus, the reserve side went through the season undefeated and were promoted to the South West Peninsula League. And the third team, consisting mainly of under 20s, won promotion to the first division of the Falmouth/Helston League.

In 2008/09, Truro were promoted to the Southern League Premier Division as Champions, in the process equalling the British record with four successive promotions. In 2009/10, the Club finished a very creditable 11th in the first year at this new level.

2010-11 was another momentous season. Vying with favourites Salisbury City for top league spot for most of the season, Truro were finally crowned Champions by four points after a fabulous 6-0 win away at Salisbury. Seven straight victories at the end of the season assured Blue Square Bet Conference South football for the first time. A new British record was set in the process as no senior club had previously won 5 promotions in 6 seasons.

Into the Conference - Season 2011/12 was a year of consolidation, with a 14th place finish in the club's first season of Conference football. Progress in 2012/13 was very difficult thanks to a 10-point deduction and a League transfer embargo as the club encountered financial problems. The club's very survival was in doubt until October 2012 and the last-minute intervention of two local businessmen. Truro were relegated at the end of the season, but lucky to be alive and kicking after recent



recent traumas.

The Club gained promotion to the newly re-named National League South in 2014/15 via the play offs. Two 1-0 victories, over Hungerford in the semi final and St Neots Town at Treyew Road, in the final saw the club return to the second tier of non-league football for the second time.

After a tentative start to the 2015-16 season, Truro gradually climbed the National League South table, surpassing all expectations to finish fourth in a play-off place. However, City came up against a well-drilled Maidstone United side in the play-off semi-final, losing 3-0 on aggregate over the two legs.

The club struggled in the lower reaches of the table in 2016/17 but there was an upturn in fortunes last season as the club reached the first-round proper of the FA Cup for the first time, where we were rewarded with a trip to Charlton Athletic.

We also found ourselves amongst the leading pack throughout the campaign before losing in the play-offs.

The eve of the 2018/19 season saw us move from our Treyew Road home to ground-share with Torquay United until the Stadium For Cornwall is ready.

In June 2019, the Club was sold to the Cornish Pirates, via a business transfer under an asset deal. This wiped the historical slate clean, heralding the start of an exciting new era.

The Cornish Pirates are a professional rugby team, who have played in the English Championship, the league below the Premiership, since 2002.

The Pirates engaged the highly experienced Alex Black as their football consultant to lead the acquisition and he remains in this role.

Colin Groves (NZ) and Rebecca Thomas, Directors of the Cornish Pirates along with cricket legend Jack Richards form the new Board. With club stalwart Deba Sidhu stepping up into the key role of Club Secretary.

2021-22 season Truro City Football Club has a ground share agreement with Plymouth Parkway.

MEET THE OPPO

- JAMES HAMON Goalkeeper The 26-year-old keeper joined the White Tigers in the summer of 2019 after impressing in preseason. The Guernsev-born goalkeeper has previously been on the books of the likes of Exeter City and Gloucester City and arrived at City with an impressive pedigree. James made 37 appearances during six years at St James Park before joining the White Tigers where he has become a fans favourite over the last two seasons. Following the curtailment of the Southern League season last year he joined Torquay United on loan before returning to Truro and agreeing a new contract in July.
- JAMIE RICHARDS Defender
 A versatile performer with higher level experience who joined the club during the course of 2015/16 following his release by Torquay United. He started his career at Southend United, where he emerged through the ranks before going on to serve the likes of Plymouth Argyle, Weymouth and Northern Irish outfit, Linfield. He has now made over 150 appearances for the club, and he

150 appearances for the club, and he was named club captain after the departure of Ben Gerring in the summer of 2018. Jamie is now entering his seventh season with the football club

● ED PALMER - Defender

The commanding centre half has a had a number of successful previous spells with the White Tigers including playing integral roles in our 2015 Play Off win as well being part of our historic FA Cup First Round squad. He re-joined the White Tigers in October 2019 following his departure from Taunton Town where he has become an integral part of the City backline. The 29-year-old agreed terms on a new Truro deal in May 2021.

O CHIECK DIABATE - Defender
Young defender Cheick Diabate joined
the White Tigers on loan from League
Two side Exeter City in July 2021. The
20-year-old Exeter Academy graduate
made his Grecians debut in October
2020 against West Bromwich Albion in
the EFL Trophy. He has also had loan
spells with local sides Buckland

- NIALL THOMPSON Defender
 The versatile winger/full back is a
 popular figure whose former clubs
 include Hucknall Town, Sheffield FC,
 Mickleover Sports and Torquay United,
 from where he was loaned to The
 White Tigers in 2014/15. Niall was part of
 our record-breaking FA Cup first round
 squad in 2017 and has played
 anywhere from striker to right-back. He
 was named the clubs Player of the
 Season in the 2019/20 season. Going
 into his sixth full season with the White
 Tigers, he agreed a new deal in May
 2021.
- ELLIS JOHNSON Defender
 Young defender Ellis Johnson joined the
 White Tigers in the summer of 2021 on
 loan from League Two side Exeter City.
 The energetic full-back trialled with the
 club during pre-season and signed a
 few weeks later. The 18-year-old has
 been a regular for the Grecians Under
 18s squad being a star man in their
 Youth Alliance League and FA Youth
 Cup campaigns.
- CONNOR RILEY-LOWE Defender Riley-Lowe started his career with League Two side Exeter City, where he came through the club's academy before signing his first professional contract with the Grecians in 2014. He ended up making 14 first team appearances for the club, in between having two highly successful loan spells in Cornwall with Truro. Following his release from the Devon side, he was

quickly snapped up by the White Tigers on a permanent basics in the summer of 2017 where he starred across two campaigns and was named Player of the Year on both occasions before deciding to leave to join Bath City in 2019. He returned to Treyew Road after a year away following his release from the Somerset side in 2020.

● SHANE WHITE - Defender

The versatile player can operate across the backline or in midfield rejoined the White Tigers after 4 years away with Taunton Town in 2020. He starred for the Peacocks in their FA Cup First Round run as well as their promotion to the Southern League. He originally joined the club on loan in 2008 from Plymouth Argyle before signing permanently in 2013 and had 3 incredibly successful seasons before ioining the Somerset outfit. He scored the goal that saw us promoted back to the National League South in 2015 in a 1-0 home win over St Neots Town. He agreed new terms to extend his stay in May 2021.

• RYAN BRETT - Midfielder
Midfielder Ryan Brett joined fellow
midfielder Shane White in making the
switch back to Truro from Taunton
Town in 2020. He started his career
with Plymouth Argyle be enduring
success with Salisbury City. He spent
three seasons with Truro before joining
Taunton in 2017. He returned to Truro
last season and played a key role in



Paul Wotton's side before the season was curtailed in January.

• RYAN DICKSON - Midfielder
The 34-year-old Saltash born player
who can play as both a centre
midfielder and left back has
represented a host of Football League
clubs including Plymouth Argyle,
Brentford, Southampton, Colchester
United, Crawley Town and Yeovil Town.
He originally joined the White Tigers on
loan from Torquay in 2019 before
signing on a permanent basis following
his release from the Devon club. Ryan is
a popular figure among players and
supporters, and he agreed a new
contract with the club in May 2021.

WILL DEAN - Midfielder

Talented midfielder Will Dean became Paul Wotton's first summer signing, ioining after his release from Exeter City. Having gone through the Grecians Academy setup, Will spent the 2019/20 on loan with the White Tigers where he was voted the Players Player of the Season. He returned the St James Park and made his debut for the first team in September 2020 in a 2-2 draw with Salford City. A loan move to Bath City then followed before he was released by Exeter earlier this year. There was a lot of interest from higher leagues, but Will chose the White Tigers as the place to play his football this season.

◆ DAN ROONEY - Midfielder Currently in his second spell with the White Tigers. He originally signed back in 2019 on loan from parent club Plymouth Argyle where he showed his quality despite such a young age. A skilful and exciting player, Dan was quickly snapped up by Paul Wotton following his departure from Bath City in 2020 whom he spent a month with following a brief spell with Bury after his release from Plymouth Argyle that summer. Dan agreed terms on a new deal with the White Tigers in May 2021.

● RIO GARSIDE - Midfielder Former Plymouth Arayle academy player Rio Garside joined the club in the summer of 2019 after impressing in a trial game against his former side. The hardworking and technically gifted midfielder played a number of times for the Arayle reserve team in the South West Peninsula League in 2018/19 and joined us following his release from the Pilgrims in May 2019. The skilful youngster showed his talent and ability across midfield the last two seasons for the White Tigers and was deservedly rewarded with a new contract this summer.

• GEORGE TUCKER - Midfielder
Truro born midfielder George Tucker
joined the club from South West
Peninsula League side St Austell in the
summer of 2020. The Cornishman
came through the Plymouth Argyle
academy before joining St Austell. He
had a brief loan spell with local side
Falmouth Town last season, but he only
managed one game before the season

• ANDREW NEAL - Striker
Neal returned to the White Tigers in
2020 following his departure from
Taunton Town. Having scored 60 goals
for Bodmin Town, the striker originally
joined Truro in 2016 where he endured
two successful seasons before
departing in 2018 to join the Somerset
club. He netted 36 goals in his debut
season for the Peacocks before hitting
a further 16 last season. He continued
his goalscoring with City last season
and is hoping for more of the same in

● TYLER HARVEY - Striker

2021/22

The livewire front-man re-joined club after briefly leaving for Bath City in September 2019. Having come through the ranks at Plymouth Argyle the striker made 50 appearances for the Pilgrims before joining Wrexham. He joined the White Tigers in 2017 and has scored some important goals including one at Charlton Athletic in the FA Cup. He scored 25 goals in the National League South before 20 in the Southern League in 2019/20 so is a real goal threat. He was also our top goal scorer last season before it was curtailed.

• STEWART YETTON - Striker

Affectionately known as "Yetti", an absolute City Club legend. Originally from across the Tamar and Plymouth where he began his career in 2003 with Argyle. He first joined City in 2005 and became a prolific goal scorer with 200 goals by early 2010. In the 2006-07

season he scored he scored 72 goals including 6 in one match. In 2013 he joined Weymouth then having spells with Plymouth Parkway and Tiverton Town, but he was never far away from City and at the start of the 2019-20 season, Yetti once again re-joined City as player and assistant manager.

● PAUL WOTTON - Manager
Paul became the clubs first team
manager in the summer of 2019 after a
number of years as assistant manager
at Plymouth Argyle. Paul had an
impressive playing career with over
500 appearances in the Football
League, playing for the likes of Plymouth
Argyle, Southampton and Yeovil Town.
He is now beginning his third season
with the club after agreeing a new long
term contract with the club earlier this
year.



Town lost out to the early league leaders in West London despite fighting back to draw level in the first half after an early onslaught from the hosts. However a goal after the break was sufficient to secure the points for United to maintain their 100% record after four fixtures whilst Town will rue a missed late opportunity to salvage a draw.

There was some relief on the injury front before kick-off with the return of Ben Adelsbury and Dan Sullivan to the squad but Lee Lucas, loan Richards and Jared Lewinaton were all deemed not fit for selection and did not travel to the SkyEx Community Stadium. The home side demonstrated why they sat atop the table from the whistle as they

tore into Town. Amos Nasha and Hassan Jalloh saw shots blocked and deflected respectively in the opening minutes before Jalloh, who proved a thorn in the Peacocks feathers all afternoon, found Moses Emmanuel inside and his strike forced Llovd Irish into his first save of the match as he touched the effort wide.

However the early pressure paid off after five minutes. A strong run from Francis Amartey won a corner which arrived from the left, Irish went to claim but the ball slipped through his hands and Keano Robinson was on the far post to volley over the line to put Hayes ahead. The hosts were in control as the game reached the quarter hour mark at which point the Peacocks conjured



The home side wasted a chance to regain the lead soon after, Emmanuel setting up Amartey for a shot which he drilled over the top, as Hayes continued to attack with strength and pace. The leveller though was what Town needed to gain a foothold in the game, with Chamberlain prominent in a positive Town response. He received a pass from Joe Guest to fire a 30 yard effort off the crossbar just past the half hour before he won the ball to feed Ross Staley who rifled an angled strike narrowly over. Jack Goodall's ball down the right then reached Hill whose shot from the right side of the box was blocked by Smith for a corner which was headed over by Adelsbury.

As the interval approached Hayes enjoyed another intense phase of pressure on the Town defence who had Irish to thank for the keeping the teams level. Omar Rowe's inswinging cross from the right was pushed wide by Irish after Emmanuel had just failed to connect and when the ball was returned into the middle the Peacocks keeper dived to keep out Ben

Frempah's header and smother Jalloh's attempted follow-up. The crisis eased when Emmanuel drilled a shot way over from the ensuing corner before the half came to an end.

The second period was only four minutes old when the visitors suffered yet another injury blow, Jay Foulston limping off to be replaced by Sullivan for his first appearance of the season. There was then a brief melee between players, cause of incident unknown, which saw Rowe and Jalloh along with Town's Hill enter the referee's notebook.

The contest soon settled back into type, with the hosts on the front foot. Amartey cut in from the left to try his luck but Irish held comfortably and then Jalloh found space, only to drag his shot wide of the target. A superb blocking tackle by Adelsbury prevented Jalloh from doing more damage before Irish was again called into action, blocking a shot from Emmanuel following a clever ball from Nasha. Moments later the decisive goal of the game arrived with 15 minutes left on the clock. Jalloh swung in a free kick from the left and Emmanuel dived in to glance a header beyond Irish and into the net off the post.


Jack Veale replaced Goodall with ten minutes remaining and very nearly gained Town a point. Sullivan got clear



down the right and his centre got a diversion off the defender to fall nicely for the incoming Veale whose strike was the right height for Smith to palm away for the ball to be cleared but Town regained possession, however Chamberlain's shot was wide.

As the game entered stoppage time, Town kept pressing to try and salvage a point but failed to create a clear opportunity. Smith required treatment following a corner to further drag the game out and the last hope came and went when Staley's free kick into the box came off Veale and travelled harmlessly to the keeper, leaving Town to regroup for another important game today against Truro City



The FA's restructure at Steps 4-6 this summer solved some problems but not all.

Clubs who had performed consistently over the curtailed seasons of 2019-20 and 2020-21 were awarded promotion on points-per-game.

In total, 110 clubs were upwardly moved as a new Northern Premier League Midlands division was formed at Step 4, two new Step 5 divisions administered by the Combined Counties League and the United Counties League and the Step 6 structure reduced to 17 divisions.

But vacancies across Steps 1-4, due to the resignations of clubs over the past two years, still remained although it was never the FA's intention to fill them as part of the restructure.

Instead, the vacancies will be filled ahead of the 2022-23 season via reprieves as laid down in the FA rules.

Providing no club goes under or fails its ground grading during this season, this is what should happen:

At Step 2, each champion and play-off winner is promoted (four clubs in total). The bottom clubs in National League North and South will be relegated (two clubs in total). Step 2 is increasing to 24 teams in each

league from the 2022-23 season.

At Step 3, each champion and play-off winner is promoted (eight clubs in total). Of the 16 clubs finishing in relegation positions, seven will be reprieved, comprising the clubs finishing 4th bottom in each Step 3 division plus three of the four clubs that finish 3rd bottom with the best unweighted points-per-game record. The 3rd bottom club with the worst PPG record across the Step, plus all 2nd bottom and bottom placed clubs will be relegated.

At Step 4, each champion and play-off winner is promoted (16 clubs in total). Sixteen Step 5 champion clubs are automatically promoted and replace the bottom and 2nd bottom clubs at Step 4. Nine clubs with the best points-per-game are reprieved due to the vacancies at Steps 1-4 and the number of clubs at Step 2 increasing. This will leave seven Step 4 clubs playing off against seven Step 5 runners-up with the remaining eligible Step 5 clubs promoted.

Although reprieves are usually awarded to clubs with the best PPG records, the FA Alliance Committee has the power to vary that model.

- 12. Persons must not consume alcohol that has not been purchased at Taunton Town FC.
- 13. Persons must not consume alcohol in any alcohol free designated areas.
- 14. There will be zero tolorance to alcohol abuse/misuse.
- 15. There will be zero tolorance to drug possession, use and abuse.
- 16. Smoking is permitted in the stadium except in areas designated as a No Smoking area.
- Umbrellas are permitted within the stadium but must not be used if obstructing the view of other spectators.

- A) The Club does not accept any responsibility or liability whatsoever for any loss or damage to vehicles or their contents, or any other personal property brought onto the Clubs premises and stadium.
