THE AWAY END Nimborge Jown

Wimborne Town Football Club was formed in 1878 and originally catered for both football and rugby. In 1884 the South Hampshire and Dorset Football Association was formed with Wimborne as one of the founder members. Three years later the Club became a founder member of the Dorset County Football Association. The Club's first success came in 1913 when they won the Dorset Minor Cup for the only time. A year later they were runners-up in the Dorset Junior Challenge Cup.

The Thirties were a triumphant period in Wimborne Town's history as they carried off the Dorset League Division Two title three times and finished runners-up on a further occasion. The Magpies were also runners-up in Dorset League Division One in 1939. This period also proved successful for Wimborne in cup competitions. The Dorset Junior Challenge Cup was won twice in three final appearances and the Magpies enjoyed four Dorset Junior Amateur Cup victories in five seasons between 1935 and 1939.

Wimborne's first senior honour came in 1937 with the Dorset Senior Amateur Cup but this turned out to be the last honour for some while and it was not until 1964 that this success was repeated. After another lean spell, this time 17 years, Wimborne won the Dorset League Division One championship without losing a match. The Reserve team retained the championship the following season.

In 1981, following the installation of floodlights and the construction of a perimeter wall and new changing rooms at their Cuthbury ground, Wimborne were admitted to the First Division of the Western League. They immediately established themselves among the leading clubs, just losing out on third spot to local rivals Swanage on goal difference. The 1984/85 season saw Wimborne Town's most



successful in the Western League when they finished in third place, this time ahead of Swanage on goal difference.

Wimborne Town joined the Wessex League in 1987 and stayed for he next 23 seasons, finishing outside the top eight only once. During that time the Magpies won the title on three occasions, in 1991/92, 1993/4 and 1999/2000 and twice finished runners-up, in 1992/93 and 1996/97. Wimborne won the Wessex League Cup in 1993/94 to become the first club to achieve the League and Cup double and this feat was repeated in 1999/2000 & 2007/08. They were also runners-up in 1990/91 and 1995/96.

In recent years, Wimborne Town have appeared in 12 County Cup Finals. The Dorset Senior Challenge Cup Final has been contested eight times with victories in 1991/92 and 1996/97. Wimborne have also reached the Dorset League Cup Final on four occasions.

The Magpies entered FA competitions for the first time in many years in 1982/83 when wins over Bridport, Falmouth Town, St Blazey, Bath City and Merthyr Tydfil earned them a visit to Aldershot, then a Football League side, in the First Round Proper. That's where the Wembley dream ended, however, with a gallant 4-0 exit.

Before 1992, Wimborne Town's best performances in the FA Vase had brought them Third Round appearances on three occasions. However, that record was eclipsed in 1992, when the Club, led by Chairman Brian Maidment & manager Alex Pike, enjoyed an epic run to the Wembley final where they defeated favourites Guiseley 5-3 to lift the trophy. In so doing, Wimborne Town became the first ever Dorset club at any level to contest a Wembley final. During that same historic season, Wimborne also won the Dorset Senior Challenge Cup and Wessex League championship to complete a unique treble of trophies.

Season 2009/10 saw the Club, managed by Alex Browne, gain promotion to the Southern League, the highest position in the non-league pyramid that Wimborne Town has occupied in its history.

Steve Cuss was appointed manager in June 2011 and he led the Magpies to 12th spot in the table in season 2012/13. After four years of service, during which time Steve established the Club in the Southern League and led them to the First Round

resigned in May 2016.

Proper of the FA Trophy in 2014/15, he resigned in November 2015, club stalwart Paul Roast took over as caretaker boss before replacement Simon Browne the brother of previous manager Alex took over full time. Unfortunately, Simon's financial expectations for the 2016-17 season could not be met, the playing budget being slashed and most of the squad leaving, relegation was avoided and he

In July 2016, ex professional and former AFC Bournemouth Pre-Academy Lead Coach, Matty Holmes joined Wimborne Town as 1st Team Manager. Matty brought his brother Danny with him. Together, they work hard on introducing a new brand of football, which has proved both pleasing to the eye and effective. Matty assembled a strong but young squad which achieved our then highest position in the Southern League of 11th.

The team improved on that in 2017-18, finishing 3rd on 77 points, having scored over 100 goals, and winning the Dorset Senior Cup for the first time in 21 years. The euphoria was muted by a play-off final defeat by Swindon Supermarine in a penalty shoot-out. However, the restructuring of leagues at Steps 3 and 4, and the demise of Shaw Lane FC led to a late promotion for Wimborne as the highest performing team not already promoted.

In 2018/19 The Magpies played at Step 3 for the first time in their history in the Southern League Premier South. After an initial struggle, they held their own in the bottom half of the table. And on a dramatic last day of the season, when seven teams were in danger of falling into the third relegation spot, Wimborne ended up in 14th place, albeit with just three points to spare.

In September 2019 Matty Holmes stepped down as Wimborne Team Manager to concentrate on building and setting up the new Wimborne Town FC Elite Academy, something that Matty had been building up since his time with Wimborne Town FC.

Matty's brother Danny stepped up from Assistant Manager to become Manager with James Stokoe taking on the role as Assistant/Player Manager. When the 2019/20 season was abandoned in March, Wimborne were lying in 15th place.

As thoughts turned to the 2020/21 season, and with club budgets under serious




scrutiny, Danny Holmes resigned as Manager. The Board wasted no time in appointing club legend James Stokoe as Manager, and he brought in another former player, Mark Gamble, as his Assistant. But with only five players remaining from the previous season, and on a vastly reduced budget, the new management duo set about rebuilding the team.

Although the league season was again curtailed with Wimborne having played just 6 games, there was time for the club to have a thrilling FA Cup run - reaching the 4th Round Qualifying for the first time since 1986.

In December 2020 the club moved into its brand new stadium, named New Cuthbury, on the other side of town. The Development Team were able to successfully complete their season at the new ground winning the Hampshire Combination and Development League Premier Division, but the first team had to wait until the start of the 2021/22 season to play their first league game there.

In the summer of 2021 a 3G training pitch was installed next to the main ground and will be used by the club's new Academy, Development Centre teams from U9s to U16s, and 20 Youth teams. The future for the club looks exciting.

- MARK GAMBLE Striker In his three seasons as a player at WTFC, 'Gambo' scored 77 goals in 99 appearances. Mark managed the BTEC programme at Southampton for 12 vears. He holds a UEFA B licence.
- DAN BARTLETT Midfield Joined the club this month
- LEWIS BEALE Striker On a short loan from Vanarama National League side Eastleigh FC. Lewis came through the ranks at the Silverlake Stadium, making his firstteam debut in 2018/19. He has had previous loan spells at US Portsmouth, AFC Totton, and Metropolitan Police, for whom he scored 4 times in 9 games.

- JEZ BEDFORD Midfield Jez was at Portsmouth in their Youth set-up from age 14-19. After first being on loan, he then joined Poole Town, making over 100 appearances for the Dolphins. He has now crossed over the River Stour to join the Magpies.
- GERARD BENFIELD Goalkeeper Joined the club this month
- DANIEL CANN Striker Joined the club in October 2021
- JAKE CARSWELL Midfield Jake's formative football years took in the Matt Le Tissier Academy. Grange Athletic, and New Milton, Last season he captained Wimborne's Development Team which won the Hampshire Combination and Development League Premier Division.
- CALLUM CHUGG Defence Callum started out at Blackfield & Langley aged 16. He moved to AFC Fawley, AFC Totton, Gosport Borough, then back to Blackfield and Totton before joining the Magpies in the summer as one of Manager Stokoe's first signings.

- RYAN HALL Goalkeeper Ryan started off in the Portsmouth Academy 2008-16, before joining Aldershot Town 2016-21. The biggest game he's played in was in the National League for Aldershot against Bromley.
- JAMIE HENRY Midfield Jamie was at Aberdeen FC for 3 years, captaining the under 20s team and winning the league. He then signed with Arbroath in 2017 playing half a season there before moving onto Annan Athletic. After that he signed for Pollok FC who are a big semi pro club in Glasgow. He played there until signing for Wimborne in September 2020.
- MARK JAMISON Defender Mark rejoined The Magpies in September 2021. Ten years previously he was with us for our second season in the Southern League under Manager Steve Cuss, making 29 appearances. On the team photo for that season. Mark, as a 19 year old newboy, managed to position himself on the front row between the club captain and club officials. After that season Mark moved away for work and study and played for a number of teams in the London area, including Wingate & Finchley, Beaconsfield and finally Corinthian Casuals, He was with Casuals for three seasons playing in the Isthmian Premier before returning to Wimborne.
- JAMES LANGDON Goalkeeper James recently graduated from

Eastleigh and earning a professional contract there. He was released at the end of last season and joined The Magpies.

- CAMERON SMITH Midfield
 Cam's football development included
 the AFC Bournemouth Academy and
 Wales National Development squad at
 u14 & u15 before being part of
 Wimborne's Development Team.
- . DAN STRUGNELL Defence
 Dan was at AFC Bournemouth from
 age 12 to 20. He then spent 7 years at
 Havant & Waterlooville achieving back
 to back promotions from the Ryman
 Premier and National League South,
 playing in the National League in 201819. Last season he was at Dorchester
 for a brief spell before joining Gosport.
 While at AFCB Dan had his first taste of
 senior football in loan at Wimborne in
 2011.
- . DACK TORNIAINEN Defender
 Jack has joined Wimborne on dualregistration with Vanarama National
 League side Eastleigh. He previously
 had a short spell with our league rivals
 Beaconsfield Town. The 20 year old
 defender signed full-time with the
 Spitfires in the summer having
 impressed in the club's development
 team since arriving in July 2020.
 He was originally on the books at
 Championship side AFC Bournemouth
 where he progressed to play regularly
 for the Cherries under 18 side.
 He also got his first taste of senior

football with a loan spell with Dorchester Town from September 2019 until January 2020 where he played 12 games scoring once.

Jared Lewington's 10th goal of the season proved sufficient to maintain the Peacock's unbeaten run as they claimed the League double over the Magpies. Dorchester had proved a difficult nut to crack earlier in the season when Town scraped through with a 2-1 win and the contest at the Avenue Stadium was no different, Lewington's header being the reward for some excellent football in the first half before the hosts clawed themselves back into the game after the break when the Peacocks had to show their defensive mettle.

With defender Jake Wannell ruled out with a hand injury, the side had to be shuffled following Monday's win over Tiverton, with Zac Smith stepping back into the team on the right. A wet afternoon did not deter a sizeable travelling support from making the journey into Dorset and they saw their team make a confident start on the 3G pitch.

Ross Stearn's cross was deflected to Magpies' keeper Jack Bycroft before the first opening came after three minutes, Chamberlain crossing from the left to find Lewington who glanced a header wide of the target.

The first home foray saw Will Buse claim a Tiago Sa cross, but it was the visitors who were looking much the better side going forward. After Chamberlain had a low shot from the edge of the box held by Bycroft, the Magpies' keeper was beaten after 17 minutes when the Peacocks scored what proved to be the winner. A break down the right saw Zac Smith curl in an enticing cross which Lewington skilfully headed across Bycroft into the far corner.

Town were spraying the ball around nicely with Lloyd James instrumental in the middle and it was from his cross that Town came

close again, the ball reaching Chamberlain whose strike from the left took a deflection and Bycroft tipped over. Another
Chamberlain centre across goal couldn't pick out a teammate while James had an effort blocked before the only real moment of concern for Town in the opening period came just past the half hour mark when Olaf Koszela got clear from the middle and despite rounding Buse, the Peacocks' custodian managed to intervene and claim the ball. A brief flurry from the home side before the interval led to Koszela's shot being blocked by Jay Foulston but Town were well worth their lead at the break.

The visitors were forced to make a change ahead of the action resuming, birthday boy Gethyn Hill coming on for Toby Holmes who had seemed to jar his ankle on the plastic surface towards the end of the first half. Town's goalscorer Lewington soon followed with a knock, and he was replaced by Dan Sullivan whose first contribution was a goalbound shot which deflected for a throw-in. Chamberlain, who had a fine game on the flank, also fired in an effort which went wide while a good build-up on the left ended with Stearn's strike from the edge of the box, but the effort proved a routine stop for Bycroft. Stearn did have the ball in the net soon after, latching onto Chamberlain's lofted pass, but the flag was already raised for offside.

Town made their third and final substitution when Joe Budd replaced Stearn and he was soon involved, having a low shot held by Bycroft after the ball had fallen loose from Chamberlain's cross. Dorchester

though were having more possession as the half progressed and with only a single goal advantage there was always a chance for the hosts but the Town defence were more than equal to what they had to offer.

Pressure from the Magpies saw Alfie
Stanley neatly turn on the edge of the area and curl a shot narrowly past the post and Buse then easily held a strike from Tom
Purrington. At the opposite end, the
Peacocks couldn't engineer a second to make the game safe, Nick Grimes heading wide from a James free kick

There were some nervy moments as the final minutes ticked away, Chamberlain receiving the only booking of the game, but the free kick came to nothing, before six minutes of stoppage time were signalled. Quite where that amount of added time came from is a mystery and tempers became more heated two minutes into stoppage when Joe Guest's pass over the top found Sullivan whose drive from 16 yards was clearly palmed over the top by keeper Bycroft. Referee Clinton mystifyingly awarded a goal kick instead, angering fans, players, and management alike which culminated in Rob Dray and Jared Lewington being sent from the bench. Buse had to make one final save, clutching a Koszela shot from the edge of the box but the Peacocks had done enough to chalk off another win and keep their interest very much alive in 6th spot.

Happy New Year and first we must ask: Is everything OK in the Premier League?

It's been difficult to open a newspaper, listen to the radio or watch the TV without hearing a top flight boss moaning about playing too many games over the festive period, bleating about a lack of players, not being able to use five subs in a game or even the League Cup schedule clogging up the calendar.

Apparently there is also concern about the fixture congestion after 18 games needed to be postponed in recent weeks. Although some welcome relief that UEFA will allow games to be played on the same nights as Champions League matches. Phew!

That sound you can hear is a collective laugh from Non-League as a whole, including fixture secretaries who might lose twice that amount of games to bad weather in the space of three days.

Look, it's easy to take pot shots at the whinging managers. When they are paid as well as they are, have access to the best facilities in elite sports and can rotate their squads far more easily than they let on, they probably deserve a bit of dig in the ribs

Non-League managers and players will have a wry smile when thinking about the schedules their players, all while working proper day jobs around it, go through. I've always felt that if those at the top of the game are concerned about player welfare, then it should be listened to. It should also be pointed out that the TV money they benefit from is based on the fact they have to play a lot of games, particularly around the Christmas period where demand is high.

But Christmas 2021 has also shown the interest for Non-League football, with crowds booming across the Pyramid. Four-figure crowds suddenly don't seem all that unusual at Steps 4, 5 and even 6.

And that's key for clubs to boost the coffers. Festive football is such an important money spinner for all Non-League clubs where the pounds across the turnstiles and the second spend in the bar is so crucial.

Fans flocking to grounds can probably be put down to a combination of factors.

Apathy at the cost of higher football, thirst for live sport, people feeling comfortable in lower crowds are no doubt among a number of reasons.

Hopefully people have also seen enough that they want to return regularly. There are plenty of games to come this season. And after the last two seasons were hit by Covid, you won't hear much moaning about it down here.

- 11. Alcohol must not be brought into the stadium.
- 12. Persons must not consume alcohol that has not been purchased at Taunton Town FC.
- 13. Persons must not consume alcohol in any alcohol free designated areas.
- 14. There will be zero tolorance to alcohol abuse/misuse.
- 15. There will be zero tolorance to drug possession, use and abuse.
- 16. Smoking is permitted in the stadium except in areas designated as a No Smoking area.
- Umbrellas are permitted within the stadium but must not be used if obstructing the view of other spectators.
