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The Away End

CHELMSFORD CITY

Founded in 1938 it is fair to say that the history of Chelmsford City Football Club hasbeen a roller coaster ride that has seen the Club at the very height of the non-league game whilst also 'enjoying' spells when the very future of the Club was at risk.

Immediately joining the Southern League, then the strongest competition outside the Football League, the club enjoyed an F.A. Cup run in its first season that saw them start at the Preliminary Round before losing 6-O at Birmingham in the Fourth Round, in front of a crowd of 44,494. On the way City accounted for League clubs Darlington and Southampton.

The outbreak of the Second World War brought the fledgling club's progress to a halt, but the 1945-1946 season saw the Club win both the Southern League and the Southern League Cup.

The late 1940's found the Club at the forefront of non-league football as they along with Colchester United, Gillingham and Merthyr Tydfil dominated the Southern League during the period up until 1950. Players such as Frank Soo, Cecil MacCormack and Syd Plunkett were attracted to New Writtle Street, and it was during this period that the record home crowd of 16,807 was established when Colchester United visited for a league match in September 1949.

When the Football League expanded from 88 clubs to 92 in 1950 the two southern clubs that got the nod were Colchester United and Gillingham, and it started a period of decline for City. So much so that by 1955 the club's finances were in such a parlous state that there was even talk of withdrawing from the Southern League.

The establishment of a Supporters Club Pool that brought in much needed funds and the appointment of John Coward as Chairman in 1960 heralded another golden era in the history of the Club. So strong were the finances that the Club owned a string of club houses around the town, an attraction that enabled the Club to bring quality players to the Club.

On the pitch it was not so good a story though, as the only honour to come the clubs way was the Southern League Cup in 1959-1960. The signing of Bobby Mason, on Wolves transfer list, without paying the required transfer fee, forced Football League clubs to look at the whole question of player registrations and City were retrospectively banned from applying for Football League membership for five years. A blow to the Club as it was, arguably, their best chance of gaining election to the elite competition.

The Southern League championship was won in 1967-1968, whilst the same season

Oxford United were knocked out of the F.A Cup, City's first win against a Football League club since 1938-1939. It was to be the end of this golden era though because by 1970 the Club was again in dire straits, saved only by a 'merger' with Brentwood Town.

The Southern League championship was won again in 1971-1972, but this proved to be a false dawn and with finances once again an issue relegation was suffered for the first time in 1976-1977, despite Jimmy Greaves being signed and topping the goalscoring charts.

The pendulum swung again when the original Company was wound up in 1980 and a new relatively debt free Company was established to take its place. This led to another period when the Club progressed although the elusive goal of reaching what is now the Football Conference could never be attained.

After a brief period of consolidation things turned downwards again and by 1994 a new low was reached. Ownership of the New Writtle Street stadium was lost and the Club was on the point of going out of existence before a group of supporters led by Trevor Wright took over the running of the Club, another Company being formed to do this.

In 1997 the Club was relegated for the third

time and was also evicted from the Stadium which began a period of nearly nine years playing firstly at Maldon Town and then at Billericay Town. This was not an ideal situation with only gate income to keep the Club alive, but in 2006 the opportunity arose to return to Chelmsford at a newly refurbished Melbourne Park.

The opening game against Billericay Town on 2 nd January 2006 saw a massive crowd watch City beat their near neighbours 2-1. In March 2008 a record crowd of 3,201 saw City beat their rivals AFC Wimbledon 3-2, the biggest crowd at a home league game since 1974. This win virtually sealed the Isthmian League championship and promotion to the Football Conference South.

The last few seasons have seen City as regular play off contestants but they have been unable to achieve the aim of promotion to the level just outside the Football League. The 2012-2013 season saw them beat Colchester United in the F.A. Cup, the fourth time they have beaten a Football League club in that competition.

Dean Holdsworth was appointed Manager in the summer of 2013 but things didn't work out and he left the role in November, eventually being replaced by former Heybridge Swifts Manager Mark Hawkes who, along with his assistant Steve Smith, enjoyed a two year spell in charge. They were replaced temporarily by coach Kevin Maher but in the summer of 2016 former Braintree Town and Bishop's Stortford Manager Rod Stringer was appointed to the Melbourne Community Stadium hot seat. The 2016-2017 saw the Club reach the National League South Play Off Final

and win the Essex Senior Cup. The 2017-2018 season was also successful as the Club reached the Nationa League South play offs and also the final of the Essex Senior Cup where they were beaten by local rivals Billericay Town.

In the 2018-19 season, Chelmsford finished fourth, however lost 3-2 in the play-offs away to Welling United; their ninth play-off campaign in total.

Robbie Simpson signed for City as a free agent in August 2019 after leaving MK Dons at the end of the 2018/19 season. He was appointed as Interim Manager late Janurary 2020 following Rod Stringer's departure.

After going unbeaten in 4 from mid-February, without losing at home, "Simmo" was appointed as the Club's new permanent First Team Manager in March 2020.

Unfortunately due to the Covid-19 pandemic two seasons were unable to be completed. The 2021-22 season would be the first full season in charge for Simpson and The Clarets' finsihed in 19th place in the league.

In contrast it has been a good start to this season with only one defeat from our first eight games to the league campaign.





ONES TO WATCH





Simeon Jackson

The Canadian striker made two appearances for City during the 2020/21 season. Having scored one goal in two appearances, Simeon made the switch to Vanarama National League side King's Lynn Town after the National League South was halted. During his time with the Linnets, the Canadian scored six goals in 17 National League appearances. Vastly experienced, having enjoyed impressive spells with Rushden & Diamonds, Gillingham and Norwich City during the early part of his career and has also made 49 senior appearances for Canada.

Dave Winfield

Experienced central defender who re-joined the Clarets in July 2021 after a previous spell between October and December 2019.

Winfield started with hometown club Aldershot where he won promotion to the Football League in 2008 and then moved to Wycombe Wanderers in 2010 where he won promotion to League One in 2011. After spells at York, Shrewsbury, and Wimbledon in the Football League he joined Ebbsfleet United and led them to playoff victory from the National League South in 2017. He was named club captain of Chelmsford in November 2021.

There were no fairytales at The Cygnet Health Care Stadium for Laverstock & Ford as the Peacocks advanced to the next stage by a single goal. Birthday boy Ross Stearn got himself on the scoresheet when a fifth minute corner from Lloyd James fell to his feet to poke the Peacocks ahead. Stearn then saw a shot blocked and McCootie's chip to the near post was glanced over keeper Matthew Taylor by Nat Jarvis but headed clear by a defender. Laverstock then had their own chances at goal with Tyler Brockway and Archie Lovegrove seeing their shots blocked and saved respectively. Taylor pushed Stearn's header over the bar before the most notable effort for visitors fell to the feet of Russell Jones who was unable to capitalise after finding himself in space in the Taunton penalty box. Taylor again denied Stearn's free kick as the half ended with the Peacocks narrowly ahead.

The second half started with a chance for the visitors as skipper Adam Bourner saw his effort from range safely held by Taunton keeper Jack Bycroft. Town had further opportunities during the half but failed to take them, a late strike from Foulston being Town's best chance to settle the tie when he saw his low effort rattle the post before being cleared. Laverstock's chance to clinch a replay came on the brink of injury time when Foulston was penalised for handball from a Pete Fletcher cross. This gave Lewis Wakeford the opportunity to give the Wiltshire side a chance to level the scoring. His penalty was low to the left and met by the leg of Bycroft who denied a replay for Laverstock as the Peacocks got away with one as they progressed to the next round.

"There are no hard feelings," quipped George about missing out on the job to Macken after meeting the former Manchester City striker and trying his office chair for size.

"He's made a good start, to be fair, and I reckon they should stick with him. I can't believe all



this has happened to me, it's been a bit overwhelming."

Another feel-good story came from Pershore Town and their cheeky calendar with a very positive message.

Players from the Hellenic League Division One side – known as the Plums – bared all in support of #CHECKYOURPLUMS after team-mate Will Green was diagnosed with testicular cancer aged 23.

Pershore hope to raise £5,000 through the calendar to support Will through his journey back to full health.

So the players stripped off to pose for photos with a big launch at the club next month set to be attended by the OddBalls Foundation to provide an education talk for youth team and first team players, plus a pop-up testing centre.

In our job, we get to see so many great initiatives going on at clubs every week.

Perhaps in the heat of battle we underestimate, or even forget, the power of good football can bring. For young and old.

THE UNTOLD GAME

- The Football War -

There was heavy rain in Mexico City on 29 th June 1969, as the national teams of El Salvador and Honduras lined up against each other in the final qualifying playoff for qualification to the 1970 World Cup. It was the third of three games, a match forced by Honduras' victory in the first leg, and El Salvador's in the second, and held in a neutral venue. The first half was a relatively calm affair, considering the violence that had taken place in the previous two games, and the sides played out a 2-2 draw, forcing extra time. With 101 minutes on the clock, Mauricio Rodriguez scored what would ultimately be the winner for El Salvador, and the players celebrated they qualification. By the time the teams had left the pitch, their countries were at war

The problems between the two countries obviously ran much deeper than football. El Salvador had a population about 50% higher than Honduras, with around one fifth of the land. In both countries, most of the farmland was owned by huge corporations (mostly American), meaning the limited land was even more restricted. But the situation was theoretically better in Honduras, and the extensive cultural similarities encouraged mass migration from El Salvador, to the extent that some 20% of the population of Honduras was Salvadoran by 1969. When Honduran's started to fight for their land, they were supported by the government, and El

Salvador made diplomatic complains about the lack of protection their own citizens received from their neighbours.

Tensions grew, and in the run up to their World Cup qualification playoff the atmosphere reached fever pitch. Posters were put up and passed around by Honduran nationalists, declaring that Salvadorans were "a thief, a drunkard, a lecher, crook or ruffian", and warning them "don't stay in Honduras. Get out or expect punishment." The entire county became a tinder box, and that box just needed a spark to set it alight. That spark came at the beginning of June, when Honduran authorities started "forcibly removing" Salvadoran families, which involved a soldier leading a family at gunpoint to the border.

Six days after these expulsions started, El Salvador made the trip to the Honduran capital of Tegucigalpa for the first playoff. The hosts won 1-0, but the match was overshadowed by the level of violence in the stands, and then in the streets, between rival fans. Two weeks later, they met in the return leg, with even more violence, to set up a final, third playoff match. While to two football teams played an prepared, relations between the two countries deteriorated. On the day of the third playoff, but before kick-off, the two severed diplomatic ties.

A few thousand fans made the journey, and

on eight minutes saw Juan Ramon Martinez drill home from the edge of the box to give El Salvador the lead. Jose Enrique Cardona, Honduras' star player, equalised eleven minutes later with a bicycle kick. Back home, the propaganda machines were already warming up when Martinez got his and El Salvador's second in the 28 th minute. By the time Honduras equalised again, early in the second half, El Salvador was preparing their air force. P51 Mustangs -Second World War fighters - were supplemented by a fleet of Cessna light aircraft which had been modified so that pilots could tip the plane to one side and drop bombs out of an open door. To say these were not advanced militaries would be an understatement.

As extra time became inevitable, the Salvadoran players started reminding each other of their compatriots suffering in Honduras, telling each other "Tenemos que Ganar" – "we have to win". And when Rodriguez picked up the ball and turned it home 11 minutes into extra time, that was exactly what they had done.

Soon after, a roar of aircraft engines could be heard over Honduras, and then air raid sirens as bombs fell from the modified Cessnas. A Polish journalist reported seeing graffiti in Tegucigalpa declaring that "nobody beats Honduras" and "we will avenge 3-0" in the build up to the violence.

The war lasted just a few days, before a ceasefire was called. But it was enough. 3000 people, mostly Hondurans, died, and as many as 300,000 were displaced. Tensions have existed between the two nations ever since. And while there were much deeper causes than sport, it is remembered today, as The Football War.

Enjoy the game.

CYGNET HEALTHCARE STADIUM REGULATIONS

Persons entering this stadium must abide by the Stadium Regulations as printed in the matchday programme and displayed on posters inside the stadium. Failure to do so may result in ejection from the premises, a ban from attending any future events and also be the subject of a football banning order. Admission to and the right remain within the stadium is strictly on condition that any person attending will adhere to the Stadium Regulations as detailed below.

- 1. All persons must comply with any directions given by a Steward, Club Official or Police
- 2. Encroachment onto the playing area, sterile area, or its adjoining parts is prohibited.
- 3. Climbing on any building, wall, fence or any other structure is prohibited.
- Persons must not throw any object onto the pitch or within the spectator areas.
- Persons must not be in possession of, and/or lighting any firework or flare.
- Chanting or singing of an obscene, indecent, discriminatory or offensive nature is not
- 7. Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discrminatory, offensive or threatening language.
- Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discrminatory, offensive or threatening gestures.
- 9. Persons must not damage or deface Club and Stadium property.
- 10. Persons must not damage, deface or obstruct any notice or advertisement.
- 11. Alcohol must not be brought into the stadium.
- Persons must not consume alcohol that has not been purchased at Taunton Town FC. 12.
