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The Away End

BATH CITY

Bath, as one of Europe's world heritage cities has a long and distinguished history. Founded by King Bladud in 875BC it was a centre of Roman life and later, in Georgian times, became the capital of English high society.

Bath City was formed in 1889 and played at the Belvoir Ground in East Twerton until the 1st World War. After this they played at Lambridge (now the site of Bath Rugby club's training ground), returning to their roots in Twerton in 1932. The club has been at Twerton Park for the last 87 years.

Originally the Club played in local football competitions, then joined the Western League in 1908, progressing to the Southern League in 1921. City played in the Western section of the Southern League, which they won in 1929/30 and 1932/33.

During the 2nd World War City played in a number of unofficial competitions and became the only semi-professional side to win a Football League trophy, the Second Division Northern Section Championship, finishing above Liverpool, Manchester United and Everton. After the war the Club were obliged to revert back to the Southern League.

Post-war the Club won the Southern League championship in 1959/60 and again in 1977/78, when they lost only two league matches during the whole season. In the first

championship-winning season, in 1960, the Club played Brighton in the FA Cup when a record 18020 attended Twerton Park.

In 1979 the Club became founder members of the Alliance Premier League, now the Football Conference, a league in which they remained until 1986/87. Relegated in that season they bounced back to the conference two years later. Bath continued in the Conference until relegation to the Southern League in the 1996/97 season.

Off the field, dramatic events have taken place over the last few years. Despite ten years of ground sharing with Bristol Rovers and good FA Cup runs, City continued to spend more than they earned. In December 1997, matters finally came to a head when, faced with mounting debts, the Club's major shareholder negotiated for the Independent Supporters Association to take over the running of the Club. In 2002, the Supporters Society ('Trust') was set up with the help of 'Supporters Direct' and in one year raised nearly £250,000 from Trust members and private shareholders to buy back the club and regain control from the majority shareholder.

Former City player and Wales international, Paul Bodin, managed the club for 3 seasons before making way for Alan Pridham in May 2001. The club narrowly avoided relegation by winning their final 2 matches of the 2001-02 season and improved to 14th place

in 2002-03. After a poor start to 2003-04, Pridham was replaced by Gary Owers. He guided City to 6th place in 2004-05, but that season's highlight was reaching the 2nd round of the FA Cup.

John Relish took over as manager in May 2005 and after coming second in 2006, City emphatically won the Southern League title in May 2007 to earn promotion to the Conference South. Relish left in October 2008 with his assistant, Adie Britton taking over. After successive 8th place finishes, City secured promotion back to the Conference National after finishing 4th and winning the play-off final at Twerton Park in 2010. After an excellent 10th place finish in their first season City endured a miserable season only climbing off the bottom of the division with one game to go. Back in Conference South, after brief flirtations with the top and bottom of the division, City finished 11th but in October 2012 saw a change of manager as Lee Howells took over from Adie Britton. Howells guided City to an improved 7th in 2013-14.

The 2014-15 season saw City lose on penalties to North Ferriby United in the FA Trophy semi-final, the furthest they have got in the competition's history. Fourteenth place was achieved in the league.

Gary Owers was reappointed manager in February 2016 after the resignation of Lee Howells and he oversaw a run of five wins in the final seven matches to preserve City's National League South status. Throughout the 2016-17 season they flirted with the play-off positions but inconsistency ensured a 9th place finish. After a promising start to the 2017-18 season Owers left to take charge of Torquay United and former City player, Jerry Gill, was appointed and took

the club to a respectable 9th position. City improved on this during the 2018-19 season, finishing 5th and during the curtailed 2019-20 season came fourth but on both occasions have lost at the first hurdle in the play-offs. After the 2020-21 season was aborted, City finished a disappointing 18th during the 2021-22 season.

Off the field the club has moved to Community ownership following a successful 'Back the bid' campaign during the past two years. This has given the club greater stability and the ability to move forward on and off the pitch with the redevelopment of Twerton Park the long term plan.

City have a proud FA Cup history having reached the third round proper 6 times. Wins against league clubs along the way have included Crystal Palace, Exeter City, Notts County, Millwall, Southend United, Cardiff City, Hereford United and Grimsby Town.

Tom joined City on a permanent basis having enjoyed loan spells at Twerton Park from both Swindon Town and Cheltenham Town. Has an excellent goal ratio for a midfielder and was National League South player of the year for the 2019-20 season. He has made over 150 appearances for City.



Cody Cooke

Cody spent seven years with Truro City before making the move to Scotland to join St Mirren. After two injury and Covid interrupted seasons he returned South for a season with Weymouth before joining The Romans at the start of the 2021-22 season and finished top scorer with 20 goals.

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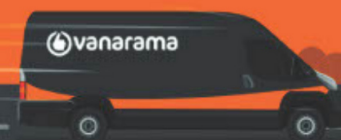

TAUNTON TOWN CHELMSFORD CITY

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VANARAMA NATIONAL LEAGUES SOUTH - SATURDAY 24th SEPTEMBER 2022

VENUE: CYGNET HEALTHCARE STADIUM - ATTENDANCE: 928

Another National League South game of defences ruling the roost led to the Peacock's third goalless draw of the season. Whilst the point against a City team in 4th spot was commendable, both sides did not deserve any more, with neither doing enough up front to warrant victory in what was frankly a dull contest with few moments of creativity or excitement to entertain the 928 crowd.

With Dan Ball ruled out through illness, Jay Foulston had to switch to centre half while Lee Lucas, Joe Guest and Dave Sims-Burgess were brought in to replace Nat Jarvis, Ross Stearn and Dylan Morgan from the previous weekend's inadequate FA Cup showing. The Clarets, beaten only once in eight League fixtures so far, began the brighter. A decent cross from the left by Eduino Vaz was headed clear and fell to Charlie Ruff but his soft volley proved easy pickings for Jack Bycroft in the Town goal while a mistake by Guest allowed Jamie Yila to make ground and cut the ball back for Ruff to drive goalwards, with Foulston making the block. A free kick 20 yards out after Nick Grimes had fouled Simeon Jackson then gave Cameron James an

opportunity which he curled way over the top.

It wasn't until the 22nd minute that the Peacocks posted their first attempt. Lloyd James' free kick from a central position was knocked down by Grimes and fell to Lucas on the edge of the box but he was unable to keep his strike down as it sailed over the bar. Grimes was involved again a minute later, James curling another free kick to the back post where the Town skipper ran in to plant a header back across goal and narrowly over. Nick McCootie's flick set up James for a shot which was blocked and from the ensuing corner, James latched onto the clearance to lob high over the target. Khale Da Costa moved inside to balloon a strike over for the visitors, epitomising a forgettable first half.

Chelmsford keeper Ove Ejejeri escaped with a couple of errors when play resumed. A misheaded clearance fell to Lucas whose lob was caught by the keeper who then miscued his punch from Foulston's corner towards goal where McCootie couldn't get enough on his header to direct in. Ejejeri made his only real save of the match on 65

minutes when he gathered Ollie Chamberlain's strike from distance before Town made a double switch two minutes later, Ross Staley and Stearn taking over from Lucas and Sims-Burgess. Town were having the better of it at this stage, with a nice move seeing James feed Chamberlain whose cross missed a claret shirt and when the ball was returned into the box by Foulston, the clearance fell to Joe Budd who fired a left-footed shot inches over the bar.

Chamberlain drove another shot high and wide before Chelmsford started to take the initiative for the final ten minutes. Liam Trotter played square to Henry Ochieng who slanted an effort wide from the edge of the area and a Kai Yearn corner was nodded back in by James with no City player able to connect where it mattered.

The visitors continued their quest during six minutes of stoppage time, Jackson having a close range shot blocked by Grimes before the City striker might have done better from Yearn's centre, running in at the near post to head the wrong side of the post (or right from Town's perspective). A corner from the left then rebounded off Grimes and squirmed wide of the upright while a further two late corners were unsuccessful for the Clarets as Town secured the point.

Just five goals conceded from nine National League games is a fantastic achievement for the Peacocks but the fact only six goals have been scored is more concerning and an improvement will surely see some of the draws being turned into victories.

ESSENTIAL READING FOR FOLLOWERS OF THE NATIONAL GAME

Is this the week the weather officially 'turned'? Where you feel that chill when you wake up in the morning and, most importantly, need to have a good think about which coat to wear to a game?

For me, it won't be long before it's thermals on and handwarmers in the pocket when I head out to a game. At home, though, the heating remains in the OFF position!

Of course, cost of living and rising energy prices have dominated the airwaves and how the country combats it is a big priority sat in the new Prime Minister's in-tray.

Whether it's in the supermarket, at the fuel pumps or in your home, the large majority of us will have noticed how the costs have been rising in our daily lives.

Northern Premier League chairman Mark Harris recently penned a piece for The NLP around the potential impact on clubs and put across his thoughts on how clubs may need to adapt.

But how will your own habits change? Is your spend at a Non-League ground a non-negotiable or is it a luxury outgoing you may have to trim back on?

We've teamed up with the guys at The Football Supporters' Association to get an idea of what fans are thinking with an exclusive survey.

The aim is to get some really good data that the FSA can feed back into the game and help leagues and clubs going forward into the winter.

Will rising costs affect your match attendance – both home and away – or will you spend less at the burger bar?

The survey also asks fans their view on potential cost-saving measures such as earlier kick-offs so floodlights don't need to be used, tickets and potential price increases or partial closure of parts of stadiums to reduce running costs on concession stands.

Andy Walsh, head of the national game at the FSA, said: "Non-League clubs are warning that without assistance the increase in energy prices and the effect of high inflation will create unmanageable financial pressures throughout the game, putting some clubs' futures in jeopardy.



"This survey in partnership with The Non-League Paper will gather supporters' views and help in our discussions with the football authorities and leagues, providing real data on how the rising cost of living is impacting fans, and help clubs navigate these difficult times."

THE UNTOLD GAME

- Grande Torino -

When we consider Italian football, some names just leap off of the page. Juventus, Milan, and Inter have dominated on the Italian peninsula, and for some the romance of Fiorentina, the Maradona-linked Napoli or the rare success of Roma stand out. But things could have been very different in Serie A, as another side could, perhaps should, be above them all. Despite only winning one league title since 1950, Torino built something in the 1940s that threatened to take over Italian football, and definitely outshone their city rivals. Their legacy, however, was cut short in its prime, in 1949, allowing Juventus to claim supremacy in Italy.

The 1930s saw something of a power vacuum at the top of Italian football. Despite some early Juventus dominance, they had struggled, and nobody had been able to claim their crown on a consistent basis. Across the city, however, that was about to change. Former Torino player Ferruccio Novo had made a fortune in industry after leaving the game, and at the age of 42 returned to his club as President, ready to create something special. His first call was to Vittorio Pozzo, who had just won back-to-back World Cup's as Italy manager, and Pozzo recommended a complete overhaul of the club to follow a more English model. Novo agreed, and set about filling his staff positions with accomplished, experienced experts. With Jewish Erno Egri Erbstein

brought in as a technical director. He was one of a famed crop of Hungarian technicians who helped make the nation one of the most influential in the history of football, but because of racial laws was forced to work incognito.

Between them, Novo and Erbstein made radical changes to the club, most importantly switching to a WM formation popularised by Herbert Chapman. The first signing was an 18 year old striker from Varese, Franco Ossola, who would become an important part of the side. In his first season at the club, Torino went from mid-table obscurity to just four points from champions Bologna, their best position since the unification of the Italian leagues into a national division.

The following season, with the disruption of war, saw them slip a little, but Mussolini's declaration that players were more required on the football field than the battlefield ensured the league remained competitive. Novo took advantage of the austerity of the wartime conditions by splashing his own cash, bringing in five players, including three from neighbouring Juventus. Sadly, as the war intensified, Erbstein was forced to flee back to Hungary, where he would later be captured and sent to a concentration camp. Torino, however, thrived in the conditions, just missing out on the title again in 1942 before becoming the first Italian team to win the double in 1943.

This would be the final season unbroken by war.

Following the conclusion of hostilities, however, Torino were ready to go. The damage caused throughout Italy forced the decision to, for one season only, revert to a regional group structure with a national championship game, which Torino won. This disruption means that the achievement is often not counted officially, but it didn't matter to Torino, who had an additional boost ready for the 1946-7 season: Erbstein, having survived the holocaust, was returned as manager.

It was fitting, after initially setting up the success, that Erbstein would be there to oversee it's ultimate dominance. Torino secured a strangely organised title again in 1947, before more traditional titles in 1948 and 1949. 1948 in particular saw some scintillating football: Torino won the league at a canter by 16 points, securing a 10-0 win, a 21 match unbeaten run, and scoring 125 goals.

Torino were on a high, and unsurprisingly their presence was requested across Europe. Near the conclusion of the 48-49 season, they flew out Benfica to play a friendly in honour of their captain. On the return flight, in thick fog, the pilot brought the plane down to land. Strong winds and the poor visibility had blown him off course, although how much he would know about it nobody will ever know. The first the residents of Turin knew was when a loud explosion lit up the sky on the outskirts of Turin. The plane had crashed into the Basilica di Superga with the death of all aboard. That included Erbstein, and the entire squad, barring two reserve players. The tragedy reverberated through Italian football, and the side were declared champions with four games remaining at the behest of their rivals. The crash is commemorated annually, but the club has never recovered from it. They have spent the last 70 years in the shadow of their city rivals, but things could have been so different.

CYGNET HEALTHCARE STADIUM REGULATIONS

Persons entering this stadium must abide by the Stadium Regulations as printed in the matchday programme and displayed on posters inside the stadium. Failure to do so may result in ejection from the premises, a ban from attending any future events and also be the subject of a football banning order. Admission to and the right remain within the stadium is strictly on condition that any person attending will adhere to the Stadium Regulations as detailed below.

1. All persons must comply with any directions given by a Steward, Club Official or Police Officer.
2. Encroachment onto the playing area, sterile area, or its adjoining parts is prohibited.
3. Climbing on any building, wall, fence or any other structure is prohibited.
4. Persons must not throw any object onto the pitch or within the spectator areas.
5. Persons must not be in possession of, and/or lighting any firework or flare.
6. Chanting or singing of an obscene, indecent, discriminatory or offensive nature is not permitted.
7. Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discriminatory, offensive or threatening language.
8. Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discriminatory, offensive or threatening gestures.
9. Persons must not damage or deface Club and Stadium property.
10. Persons must not damage, deface or obstruct any notice or advertisement.
11. Alcohol must not be brought into the stadium.
12. Persons must not consume alcohol that has not been purchased at Taunton Town FC.
13. Persons must not consume alcohol in any alcohol free designated areas.
14. There will be zero tolerance to alcohol abuse/misuse.
15. There will be zero tolerance to drug possession, use and abuse.
16. Smoking is permitted in the stadium except in areas designated as a No Smoking area.
17. Umbrellas are permitted within the stadium but must not be used if obstructing the view of other spectators.

Spectators must also note the following:

- A) The Club does not accept any responsibility or liability whatsoever for any loss or damage to vehicles or their contents, or any other personal property brought onto the Clubs premises and stadium.
- B) The Club is unable to accept any additional responsibility for minors attending matches beyond those matters covered by the Stadium Regulations.
- C) Photography and use of video including CCTV is in operation at all matches and events and may be used in any of our media channels as well as press releases.
- D) Dogs on a lead are permitted in the Stadium but they remain the sole responsibility of their owner at all times.
