The Away End

BRAINTREETOWN

The club was formed on 24 September 1898 as Manor Works, the works team of the Crittall Window Company, from which they gained their nickname Iron The new club took over the fixtures of the recently defunct Braintree F.C. in the North Essex League, and also took on most of the former club's players. They left the league in 1900 but returned in 1901. They won the title in 1905–06, 1910–11 and 1911–12, also winning the Mid-Essex League in 1909–10 and 1910–11. In 1911 they also joined Division 2A of the Essex & Suffolk Border League, remaining in the league until 1928.

In 1921 they were renamed Crittall Athletic to be more closely identified with their parent company. After winning Division Two (Western) in 1922-23 and 1923-24, they were promoted to the Senior Division of the Border League in 1925. In 1928 they joined the Spartan League, and in 1935 were founder members of the Eastern Counties League, although they also continued to play in the Border League. They won the Border League in 1935-36 and both the Border League and the Eastern Counties League in 1936-37 but then left the Eastern Counties League to join the newly established Essex County League. The new league folded after a single season (in which Crittall were runners-up) and the club returned to the Eastern Counties League.

After World War II the Eastern Counties League did not resume in 1945, so Crittall joined the Eastern Division of the London League instead. After finishing second in their first season, they were promoted to the Premier Division. They were invited to re-join the Eastern Counties League in 1947, but turned the offer down and remained in the London League, where they won the League Cup twice before returning to the Eastern Counties League in 1952. In 1954 they turned professional, but financial problems forced them to revert to amateur status and drop back down into the Border League at the end of the 1954–55 season.

In 1959-60 they won the league and League Cup double. They switched to the Greater London League in 1964, and then to the Metropolitan League in 1966. They were renamed Braintree & Crittall Athletic in 1968, and after winning the Legaue Cup in 1969-70, the club returned to the Eastern Counties League again. In 1981 all links with Crittall were severed and the club was renamed Braintree F.C., before adopting their current name a year later. They won their second Eastern Counties League title in 1983-84 and retained it the following season. In 1986-87 they won the Essex Senior Trophy and the following season they won the League Cup.

In 1991 Braintree moved up to the Southern Division of the Southern League. In 1996 the club asked the FA to switch leagues to reduce their travelling. After initially being refused, they were allowed to move to

Division Three of the Isthmian League, although it was an effective drop of two divisions. They were promoted as runners-up in their first season, and repeated the feat the following season. After three seasons in Division One they were promoted to the Premier Division with a third-place finish in 2000–01. They won the Premier Division in 2005–06 to earn promotion to the Conference South. The season also saw them reach the first round of the FA Cup for the first time, eventually losing 4–1 at Shrewsbury Town.

Braintree aualified for the promotion playoffs in their first season in the Conference South, but lost 1-0 to Salisbury City in the final. They also reached the play-offs the following season, but lost to Eastbourne Borough in the semi-finals. In 2010-11 they finished as Conference South champions, earning promotion to the Conference Premier. The next four seasons saw the club reach the FA Cup for the first round. losing to Tranmere Rovers, Newport County, Chesterfield and Oxford United in successive seasons. In 2015-16 they finished third in the renamed National League, qualifying for the promotion play-offs. Despite winning the first leg at Grimsby Town 1-0, they lost the home leg 2-0 after extra time. In 2016-17 the club reached the second round of the FA Cup for the first time after beating Eastbourne Borough in the first round; they eventually lost 5-2 to Millwall in the second round. They were relegated from the National League at the end of the season after finishing in the bottom four.

The 2017-18 season saw Braintree finish sixth in the National League South. In the play-offs they defeated Hemel Hempstead Town and Dartford to reach the final, in which they

beat Hampton & Richmond Borough 4-3 on penalties to earn promotion back to the National League. However, they were releagted to the National League South the following season after finishing secondfrom-bottom of the National League. 2 seasons that followed saw major disruption owing to the covid pandemic, 2021-22 season was played to a finish and despite a tough period with 11 straight defeats the team with an increased playing budget were able to secure their place in the National League for this season. Angelo Harrop was appointed as replacement for the departed Ryan Maxwell, and has had to practically rebuild the whole squad ahead of the season.

John Alan White (born 26 July 1986) is an English footballer who plays as a defender for Braintree Town. He previously played in the Football League for Colchester United and Southend United, where he made over 200 league appearances for both sides.

Kyron Farrell

Farrell began his career with Millwall, signing a professional contract in May 2016. He moved on loan to Braintree Town in January 2017. On 15 June 2017, it was announced that Farrell would join National League South side Concord Rangers following his release from Millwall. He moved to Cray Wanderers in March 2018. He the 2018-19 season with Walton Casuals. Following a three-year spell with Hampton & Richmond Borough, Farrell returned to Braintree Town in August 2022.



The common National League template of wellorganised teams largely cancelling each other out
was again in evidence at Vauxhall Road as
stalemate ensued. A draw was a fair result over a
scrappy 90 minutes although one couldn't help
feel that this may have been an opportunity
missed to gain all three. After Nick Grimes had
given the Peacocks the lead, the home side drew
level before the break and even though home
keeper Dave Saunders was busier than his
opposite number Jack Bycroft in the second half,
Town were also forced to man the pumps at the
back on several occasions as the Tudors looked to
bounce back from their midweek reverse to
Eastbourne.

Ollie Chamberlain was restored to the starting line-up to replace Joe Guest, the only alteration to the Town side which had beaten Dulwich Hamlet seven days earlier. A chilly, grey afternoon greeted the teams as they emerged onto the 3G pitch, newly installed since Town's most recent visit six years previously, and early exchanges were equally as unremarkable. Speedy wide man Brooklyn llunga's run down the right earnt the hosts the first corner of the game which was comfortably caught by Bycroft while Town appeared confident going forward without carving a clear opening until they made a breakthrough after 17 minutes. Joe Budd's cross was headed out for a corner from which Llovd James' delivery squeezed through to the far post where Dan Ball got a touch to Grimes who tapped

home from on the goal line for his first goal of the campaign.

The game was brightened up by a triple bout of fancy footwork from the Peacocks midway through the half, backheeled passes from Zac Smith and Nick McCootie finding each other before Smith tried a shapely side heel pass. No Strictly judges were present so a 9 was awarded in their absence. Town's advantage was then cancelled out just past the half hour, a raking long pass from Kyle Ajayi finding Jernade Meade on the left and he got goalside of Budd to slide the ball across the box and find Josh Castiglione unmarked at the back post and he could hardly miss into an open net.

The equaliser gave the home side a shot in the arm as they had the better of it up until the interval. Ilunga had a shot blocked while Bycroft was not totally convincing from a couple of Hemel corners, managing to gather one at the second attempt before tamely pushing away another during stoppage time which fell to Tudors' captain Godfrey Poku who fired over the top. Saunders meanwhile showed a clean pair of hands to clutch Budd's cross at full stretch at the other end.

The Hemel keeper was forced into action again six minutes into the second half, Nat Jarvis holding the ball up well and laying off to Lee Lucas whose 20 yard strike was turned wide. The corner though came to nothing, A yellow card for James, the

second in a minute to follow one for McCootie, led to a free kick at the other end, however Meade's delivery travelled wide at the far post without anyone able to get a touch. Chamberlain then rode several challenges to fire in a left-footer from the edge of the box which Saunders touched wide, leading to two corners which again failed to produce while McCootie saw his effort also deflect for another flag kick, his last contribution before being replaced by Dave Sims-Burgess.

Neither side were able to get on top as the game entered the final quarter. Hemel sub Ogo Obi was having an impact though for his side, seeing a shot deflect goalwards but Bycroft, although wrongfooted, reacted to hold. A punt downfield by a Hemel defender then so nearly ended badly for the Peacocks, Bycroft racing out to clear but not

connecting, allowing Obi to curl his effort toward an open goal from the angle of the box. Smith popped up on the line though to superbly head away. Town were unable to clear the resultant set piece, Dominic Morgan-Griffiths firing over, while the visitors survived a further two corners as Hemel pressed down the slope.

The Peacocks missed a chance to snatch victory in the dying minutes. Joe Guest, who had replaced Lucas minutes earlier, was found in space on the right but instead of trying his luck he opted to pass to Chamberlain who scuffed his effort to Saunders. Town's Man of the Match Ball robbed Ethan Holt as he looked to capitalise on Meade's long pass as seven minutes of stoppage time began, during which Sims-Burgess saw his low drive safely held by Saunders. Little else of note as a forgettable encounter ended all square.

THE UNTOLD GAME

- The Maracanazo -

The controversy surrounding this year's World Cup in Qatar rumbles on, and rightly so. A country with an appalling human right's record, where LGBTOI+ fans cannot and do not feel welcome and where hundreds or thousands of migrant workers are believed to have died in the construction of the stadia, it's hosting of the World Cup is a stain on the game. But it is far from the first time that the competition has not lived up to the liberal image football likes to portray. In 1934, Mussolini believed the World Cup could unite and advertise his fascist Italy on the global stage. Even in 1966, England's sole victory, took place in a country where homosexuality was still illegal. But perhaps none of the controversial editions come close to 1978, where the Argentinian junta so brazenly, so blatantly, hosted the World Cup to prop up their own hated regime.

It is difficult to pin down exactly to whom FIFA awarded the World Cup in 1978. The country, obviously, was Argentina, but the decision was made in 1966. The bid to host the competition was made under the Presidency of Arturo Umberto Illia, the third centre-left President in a row, representing something like a stable democracy. But, eight days before the decision was made, a coup d'etat removed Illia from office, replacing him with a military junta, who technically received the competition. Argentinian politics being as unstable as they were in the sixties and seventies. various other coups, before the return of popular Juan Peron and then his wife Isabel

(not Evita) and, eventually, another junta, which was in place when the tournament started in 1978. They had been in power for just two years, with a brutal crackdown on dissent, the removal of political liberties, and the disappearance of 30,000 people. Still, FIFA did what they do best, and concentrated on the football.

The competition itself started relatively innocuously. England, Wales and Northern Ireland failed to qualify, meaning British hopes (or, at least, interests) were pinned on Scotland, who struggled to live up to their pre-tournament optimism. 1974 finalists West Germany and the Netherlands made it through, however, as did the hosts and their arch-rivals Brazil. Joining them was Peru, which wasn't especially noteworthy at the time, but by the end of the tournament would be one of the biggest talking points in football.

The second group stage saw Argentina drawn with Brazil, Poland and Peru. After seeing off Poland, they drew with their South American rivals and would need a strong win in their final group game to qualify. Argentina started their game suspiciously late and knew that they needed a four goal victory to qualify. Peru had enjoyed a strong start to the competition but waned in the second group stage, losing 3-0 to Brazil. But such a heavy defeat seemed out of the question, and Brazil prepared to move into the final. They had reckoned without the junta.

Both Argentina and Peru have always denied any kind of arrangement. But Peru's players have admitted to a pre-match visit from the Argentina President and Henry Kissinger (The United States supported the junta, and Kissinger was a master of inflaming and easing political tensions to aid his political ambitions). Only one player, Peruvian defensive midfielder and Ballon d'Or nominee Jose Velasquez, has ever claimed wrongdoing in the match.

With the benefit of this hindsight, Mario Kempes ran through a suspiciously open defence in the 21st minute to open the scoring. Rodolfo Manzo was accused to throwing the game to secure a transfer to Velez, and he left the gap. Early in the second half, he lost Kempes from a free-kick and the Argentine got his and the team's second. Suspicious, but not necessarily damning.

But two goals would not be enough, and time was running out. Suspicious again, then, when in the 51st minute Peru's best player, and the only one to have accused his teammates of corruption, was taken off. He was replaced by Raul Gorriti, who hadn't played a minute of the competition up to this point.

The goals flowed then. A third. A fourth. A fifth. And a sixth. Argentina qualified for the final ahead of Brazil, where they would meet the Total Football of the Netherlands. In an overly physical game, Argentina forced extra time, and Kempes and Daniel Bertoni won it for the hosts.

But it was the Peru game that was remembered, and the questions marks still remain. A Peruvian senator has admitted that his nation threw the game, and Velasquez has accused some of his teammates, but there has never been any proof. The corruption always takes place behind closed doors, and it's always the football that suffers.

Enjoy the game.

- Chanting or singing of an obscene, indecent, discriminatory or offensive nature is not permitted.
- 7. Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discrminatory, offensive or threatening language.
- 8. Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discrminatory, offensive or threatening gestures.
- 9. Persons must not damage or deface Club and Stadium property.
- 10. Persons must not damage, deface or obstruct any notice or advertisement.
- 11. Alcohol must not be brought into the stadium.
- 12. Persons must not consume alcohol that has not been purchased at Taunton Town FC.
- 13. Persons must not consume alcohol in any alcohol free designated areas.
- 14. There will be zero tolorance to alcohol abuse/misuse.
- 15. There will be zero tolorance to drug possession, use and abuse.
- 16. Smoking is permitted in the stadium except in areas designated as a No Smoking area.
- Umbrellas are permitted within the stadium but must not be used if obstructing the view of other spectators.

Spectators must also note the following:

- A) The Club does not accept any responsibility or liability whatsoever for any loss or damage to vehicles or their contents, or any other personal property brought onto the Clubs premises and stadium
- B) The Club is unable to accept any additional responsibility for minors attending matches beyond those matters covered by the Stadium Regulations.
- C) Photography and use of video including CCTV is in operationat all matches and events and may be used in any of our media channels as well as press releases.
- D) Dogs on a lead are permitted in the Stadium but they remain the sole responsibility of their owner at all times.
