



THE AWAY END



ST ALBANS CITY

Following the formation of the club in April 1908 St Albans City were granted use of the council owned Clarence Park ground and entered the Spartan and Herts County leagues. Both were won prior to the Great War. After the war City joined the Athenian League. Winning that twice in three years was an achievement that paved the way to joining the Isthmian League in 1923. Within a year City were crowned champions of that league too. St Albans were the first club to win the Spartan, Athenian, and Isthmian League championships. By the end of the decade the club had won the Isthmian title on two further occasions. The 1920s could be seen as St Albans City's golden days with three Amateur Cup semi-final appearances also being made and a whole host of players gaining representative honours, including the record goalscorer Wilfred 'Billy' Minter (365 games, 356 goals), who gained three Amateur England caps.

City achieved just two more top two finishes before, along with Corinthian Casuals, being the first club to be relegated within the newly expanded Isthmian League in 1974. A second relegation was endured nine years later but it proved to be the spark for an upturn in fortunes. City turned to one of their former players John Mitchell – his semi-final goals took Fulham to the 1975 FA Cup Final – to be their new manager and with two promotions in three years the club was back

in the Premier Division of the Isthmian League. City, again under Mitchell, were denied promotion to the Conference in 1993 after finishing second to Chesham United. The Football Conference took exception to a 140-year-old oak tree situated within the terrace. The diseased tree was felled in 1998, clearing the way for City to join the Conference South as founder members in 2004 following a 5-4 play-off victory over Bedford Town.

Having battled against relegation for much of that first season, 2004-05, the Saints, now managed by Colin Lippiatt, gained promotion a year later with victory in the play-off final over Histon. After just one season in the Conference National St Albans were relegated back to Conference South but went down with the highest points total of any side to finish bottom of the Conference since the league added two extra Divisions. Life back in Conference South was far from easy and in 2011, following a deduction of ten points and a fine of £9,500 for financial irregularities, City were relegated to the Southern League.

After just three seasons, Graham Golds and Jimmy Gray led City back into Conference South with a play-off victory at Chesham United. Facing relegation in 2016, City turned to Ian Allinson with the former Arsenal player not only guiding the club to safety but settling in for a six-year stint at Clarence Park. Allinson left the Saints in October 2022 with his replacement, former City player David Noble, leading the club straight into the play-offs. Victories over Chelmsford City & Dartford took City through to the promotion final where a dominant Oxford City side were triumphant, leaving the Saints to settle for another promotion pushing season in the National League South.

In addition to winning ten league championships, St Albans City have enjoyed success in 49 cup finals. The Herts Senior Cup has been won 13 times and the Herts Charity Cup 25 times. Possibly the most prestigious cup won was the London Senior Cup in 1971, a year after being beaten finalists, and the London Challenge Cup in 1995. City also hold a most unwanted record as the side to have made more Amateur Cup semi-final appearances, four, than any other club without ever going on to play in the final. In 1999 the FA Trophy was added to the list with a semi final defeat to Forest Green Rovers. The club has also lifted silverware on foreign fields winning the Victory Cup in the Channel Islands in 1926 and 1928, and in 1927 the Liege Cup was won in Belgium. St Albans have also played matches in France, Germany and Italy. The club has reached the 2nd Round of the FA Cup on six occasions and defeated two Football League clubs; Brentford in 1924 (attendance 8,825) and Forest Green Rovers in front of the BBC cameras in 2021. The record attendance at Clarence Park was for a quarter final Amateur Cup tie with Ferryhill Athletic in February 1926 that City won 4-1 in front of 9.757 spectators.

Prior to the abolition of the Amateur England side in 1974, five St Albans players were capped by England; Barrie King (5 caps), Wilfred Minter (3), Ernest Grimsdell (2), Fred Fayers (1) and H.E. (Ted) Miller (1). Other international caps have been gained by Paddy Roche (Northern Ireland, 1), Geoff Anthony (Wales, 3), Lee Clarke (Northern Ireland U21, 1), Dave Webb (England Youth, 3), James Comley (England C (1) and Montserrat (2)), and Anton Blackwood (Antiqua & Barbuda, 1).

City's all time leading appearance maker is Phil Wood who played in 900 games between 1962-84. In addition to being City's highest goal scorer, Wilfred Minter also holds the record for scoring most goals (7) in an F.A. Cup tie and finishing on the losing side as City went down 8-7 at Dulwich Hamlet on 22nd November 1922. Seventytwo years later Steve Clark, City's second highest goalscorer and appearance maker, became the second City player to score a double hat-trick in the F.A. Cup as the Saints beat Hillingdon Borough 11-1.

The club can boast of several players to have progressed through them to the Football League, these include; Arthur Grimsdell moved from the Saints to Watford and then Tottenham Hotspur, leading them to victory in the 1921 FA Cup Final. Dean Austin also went to Spurs via Southend United, earning City £90,000 in transfer fees along the way. Other players to have moved from City to League sides include Junior Morias (Peterborough United), Tony Kelly (Stoke City), Harold Miller (Charlton Athletic, Chelsea), Allan Cockram (Brentford), Dean Williams (Brentford) and Michael Danzey (Peterborough United), George Edmonds (Wolverhampton Wanderers via Watford). Grimsdell and Edmonds faced each other in the 1921 FA Cup Final. During the 2022-23 season defenders Alex Lankshear and Riccardo di Trolio signed for Blackpool and Coventry City respectively.

GIORGIO RASULO

Midfielder Giorgio Rasulo joined St Albans City from having spent five seasons with Banbury United, playing a part in their 21/22 promotion campaign to The National League North.

Starting his career with MK Dons, Rasulo was a highly fancied prospect of the academy, making his first-team debut for the club aged just 15.

25 first-team appearances followed for The Dons between 2012-2018, with spells spent out on loan around the EFL and National League.



RYAN BLACKMAN

Central Midfielder Ryan Blackman may only have been at the club since January 2023, but has already concreted himself as a fan favourite thanks to his tireless workrate and visible passion for the club.

A coach at Tottenham Hostpur, Blackman has spent playing spells with Enfield Town, Waltham Abbey, Welling United, Concord Rangers and even a brief stint on the wrong side of the A414 with Hemel Hempstead Town.

#Up The Peacocks

THE OFFICE ESSENTIAL READING FOR FOLLOWERS OF THE NATIONAL GAME

A sunny weekday morning, a little before 9.30am and a corner kick away from Wembley Stadium, Hanwell Town are opening up their ground for assessment.

It's part of the intensive drive to look in depth at all Step 3-6 grounds in the National League System by the end of October, with National League clubs to get the same treatment later in the season.

The NLP has been invited along to see what we'd traditionally know as a ground grading in action.

Launched at the end of July, the FA and Premier League have joined forces to launch the Stadium Accreditation Programme.

For the first time since ground grading was introduced over 15 years ago, the process has been digitalised with a new tool called StadiumPower.

Think of this process as a giant audit of Non-League grounds to essentially answer the questions: What have we got? Where are the challenges and areas of need? And, crucially, how can funding be best utilised?

"Up until now, although many will be surprised at this, there has been no central database capturing not just facility information but also the nuances around it," Mark Harris, chairman of The FA's Stadium Accreditation subcommittee, tells The NLP.

"So digitalisation will give us a central database of facilities. It will allow us to identify areas of non-compliance but, more importantly, look at common areas of non-compliance.

"It's about identifying big issues that can then be linked to funding. I don't want to set any hares running but, as an example, if we found there were high numbers of perimeter fencing not compliant for whatever reason, that enables a business case to be put together to talk to funding partners like the Premier League Stadium Fund and say: There is a common need here. Let's look at whether we should focus some funding on the bigger problems club face.

"It is not there as a bigger stick to beat clubs with. It's to bring transparency and also ensure impartiality."

That and consistency are key. Previously, grading at Steps 1-4 was handled centrally by The FA, with Steps 5 and 6 overseen by leagues themselves.

Naturally, and understandably, that has led to a variation across the country.

Stadium Accreditation assessors – 25 of them all trained together – are now undertaking the mammoth task to visit around 820 individual National League System grounds.

As part of this year one assessment, at least 400 individual items at each stadium are being recorded — of those, 160 linked to the ground grading criteria for 2023-24.

There are nine sections to be filled in by the assessor, accompanied by a league observer.

It starts with general information like ground details and who uses the pitch. Then entrances and exits, clubhouse details, how big is the clubhouse and how many can it hold. Spectator information and capacities, standing and seating.

Others areas include Medical & Safety, Pitch & Floodlights, Transport & Parking, Media & Broadcast.

With the app, photos and videos can now be taken and instantly uploaded to give a literal picture of what each ground has.

A key part of this fact-finding information will link into those extras. The FA can get an idea of suitable ground stock for England youth games as well as to aid the exploding growth of women's football to help clubs get permanent bases. Likewise, it will help the FA Competitions team at Wembley HQ with their planning.

Women's Super League games require an anti-doping room. Is there one available? It all goes into the app.

An important note, nothing in respect to the actual grading criteria has changed. But the in-depth collection of data will be reviewed by The FA's now monthlymeeting Stadium Accreditation Sub Committee.

"It may well be that arising from this first round of inspections that it actually highlights some changes we may need to think about making to criteria going forward," Harris says.

StadiumPower will allow clubs to keep tabs on their own improvements, give transparency on other clubs and there will be a public-facing element so the everyday fan can see what facilities they may attend.

Another feature of the app will be a stadium simulation tool where a club can, at the click of a button, see what work is required should they be promoted to the level above.

"This is about trying to move the mindset from compliance to opportunity," Harris says.

Nearly three hours on and there are still areas to be looked at, measured and photographed. But it's another one ticked off the list with the vision for a stronger Non-League game at the end of it

Welling will no doubt have spent much of their eastward journey returning to Kent wondering how they failed to claim some reward from a game they dominated for the most part. After scoring early on through Nick McCootie, the Peacocks were forced to defend for long periods and were indebted to goalkeeper Dan Lavercombe and the woodwork for maintaining the single goal advantage until the final whistle.

Season 2023-24 is fast becoming a replica of last year as far as injuries are concerned, with the Town side again showing changes from the previous match at Weymouth. Already minus Dan Ball and Jay Foulston, Ollie Chamberlain and Nat Jarvis were added to the list due to hamstring complaints while loan striker Malachi Linton is likely to be out of action for several weeks after suffering ligament damage at Aveley, meaning McCootie started up front while there was a first start for summer recruit Marcus Day.

The opening exchanges were only notable for a flurry of vellow cards to the home side and bench as referee Corbett eagerly applied the new diktat from the FA before the Peacocks broke the

deadlock after ten minutes. A long clearance reached McCootie on the edge of the box and he managed to wriggle free from the attentions of Wings' centre half Taofiq Olomowewe and the nearby Jack Burchell to get free and slot the ball into the right-hand corner of Ben Winterbottom's net.

Having arrived at Wordsworth Drive with three defeats from three, it soon became clear that the visitors were in no mood to make it four. Right winger Jephte Tanga was proving a challenge to control and from his chipped cross, Antony Papadopoulos headed goalwards and when the ball was scrambled clear it fell to Cameron Green to fire over. The Peacocks meanwhile were finding opportunities scarce at the opposite end. Dylan Morgan robbed Lachlan Byrd to scamper away, but Byrd recovered with an excellent tackle while Ross Stearn battled to collect a goal kick but scuffed his 18 yard effort to Winterbottom. Impressive work from McCootie then earned a corner from which Lloyd James delivered and Nick Grimes headed against the bar. Nothing to see here though as the flag was already up.

Welling continued to patiently play out

from the back as they looked for an avenue through. Papadopoulos fired well wide and the dangerous Tanga outwitted two men down the right, only to see his cross booted away before the visitors upped the ante as half time approached and were handed a golden opportunity to restore parity on 40 minutes. Grimes was deemed to have hauled down Olomowewe challenging for a corner and a penalty was awarded. Lavercombe was equal to the spot kick from Papadopoulos though as he got down superbly to palm away to his left, with the loose ball being bundled wide by Tanga. A strong run in from the right by Papadopoulos also came close to an equaliser as he drilled a 20 yard strike off the bar before the same player was denied at the near post during four minutes of added time, seeing his effort blocked following a Tanga cross.

The second half saw the Wings dominate even more in terms of possession and attempts at goal. The hosts began well enough, enjoying an early spell of pressure which saw McCootie battering through the Welling backline to see his centre blocked while a James free kick from the right was played square to Lee Lucas whose shot caused more anxiety for the refreshment vans than Winterbottom as it sailed skywards into the car park. Winterbottom could quite easily have got himself a chair for the final half hour as he had virtually nothing to do. Joe Guest replaced McCootie just past the hour to help shore up the centre, however the tide remained firmly towards the Town goal. Burchell navigated rather too easily into the danger zone to see his effort saved by

Lavercombe who then stood firm to deny David Kamara after Papadopoulos had played him in, the rebound being put wide by Kamara.

With Town confined to quarters with no real outlet up top, defence became the norm for the final stages. However, the Town rearguard were not to be beaten. Sub Lewis White cut in from the left to see his strike held low down by Lavercombe, Kain Adom ventured across the edge of the box to rifle wide, and White planted a shot into the trees before five more minutes of stoppage were negotiated, White providing the only effort when he again troubled the greenery. One last attack was rebuffed and the whistle brought matters to an end. Maybe fortunate and definitely a real grind to ensure victory, but three points are three points



Untild Fame

Better Than Truyff

Johan Cruyff is a legend. Everybody knows that. He is revered in his home country and across the globe for both his ability on the pitch, and his genius off it. The Dutchman is undoubtedly one of the greatest of all time, with a tiny handful of players that can claim to have played the game better. But Cruyff himself only ever conceded that one man was better than him, one man that most have never heard of. Willy Dullens.

Dullens was born in the final months of the Second World War, in the Dutch village of Broeksittard, surviving a conflict-induced famine in his early months. Rarely without a ball at his feet, Dullens trained for six hours each day, and spent every night reading Voetballen Doe Je Zo, 'This is How you Play Football'. He was quickly a master with the ball at his feet. Returning from the pit one day, his father asked young Willy how many keepie uppies he had managed that day. The answer - 3500 - was astonishing. When he reached 6000, he stopped. Nobody, he believed, would ever beat that.

He played for his local amateur side, using his brother's birth certificate to

trick authorities when he was just 14. He shone against fully grown adults. It didn't take long for the professionals to take notice, and he was snapped up by local second tier side Sittardia, along with his two brothers.

Dullens could not have been more different to Cruyff. While the mercurial Total Footballer represented rebellious youth in the capital, the Sittardia midfielder embodied the working class and strict Christian values of Broeksittard. He never smoked, he never drank. After playing poorly in one game, he realised he had gone to bed too late and set himself a bedtime. He was quiet, and let his feet do the talking.

18 goals in his debut season saw
Sittardia promoted. Although he wasn't
able to keep the minnows in the top
flight, his talent was noticed. He started
to get called up to the national youth
teams, where he first encountered
Cruyff. They would eventually become
friends, but Dullens couldn't believe
how much the Ajax man smoked. To
treat his body that way was
inconceivable. He noted how talented
Cruyff was though, but never felt

inferior to him. He would later recall that they never lost a match they played together.

Despite relegation, a series of wonder goals ensured that he was not forgotten. Whilst playing in the second tier, he got his first Oranje senior call up, and mesmerised an experienced Belgian defence at De Kuip. The day after his debut, Dullens was the second coming, around whom Dutch football should be built. Two weeks later, he did the same to Scotland.


Despite playing in the second tier,
Dullens was named Dutch player of the
year. Ahead of Cruyff. This would be his
greatest accolade, and his undoing.
Feyenoord spent the summer trying to
sign the young man that could have
them challenging Ajax once again, but
he lined up for Sittardia once more.

In a friendly before the season opener, with his side 4-1 up, his teammates relaxed. But not Dullens. He demanded nothing less than perfection, and there was a crowd to entertain. Dribble after mazy dribble frustrated the Vitesse defence, until finally one challenge came in too late, and snapped his knee. The referee didn't even stop the game, and it was barely reported. Nobody understood the seriousness of the incident, except Dullens himself.

The Sittardia doctor told him to go home and rest, despite his insistence that he should go to the hospital. He sat on the sidelines for four weeks, as his side started poorly. When he came back, he was in pain. Ice didn't help, and his manager had no sympathy, needing him for a relegation battle. He

even received two more caps for the Netherlands, but it wasn't the same player.

Travelling to the best knee doctor in Europe didn't help, and after an eight hour surgery the worst was confirmed. Dullens retired in 1969, at the age of 22, but not before one final swansong. Cruyff and his former teammates arranged a friendly, as a way of supporting him. In front of 55,000 fans, the great Dutch hope limped out onto the pitch at the Amsterdam Arena. He knew, deep down, that this would be his last time in a stadium for a long time. The pain of not playing the game was too much. He is one of footballs great what ifs.

- 4. Persons must not throw any object onto the pitch or within the spectator areas.
- Persons must not be in possession of, and/or lighting any firework or flare.
- 6. Chanting or singing of an obscene, indecent, discriminatory or offensive nature is not permitted.
- Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discrminatory, offensive or threatening language.
- Persons must not use obscene, indecent, discriminatory, offensive or threatening ranguage.
- Persons must not damage or deface Club and Stadium property.
- Persons must not damage, deface or obstruct any notice or advertisement.
- Alcohol must not be brought into the stadium.
- Persons must not consume alcohol that has not been purchased at Taunton Town FC.
- 13. Persons must not consume alcohol in any alcohol free designated areas.
- There will be zero tolorance to alcohol abuse/misuse.
- 15. There will be zero tolorance to drug possession, use and abuse.
- Smoking is permitted in the stadium except in areas designated as a No Smoking area.
- Umbrellas are permitted within the stadium but must not be used if obstructing the view of other spectators.

Spectators must also note the following:

- A) The Club does not accept any responsibility or liability whatsoever for any loss or damage to vehicles or their contents, or any other personal property brought onto the Clubs premises and stadium.
- B) The Club is unable to accept any additional responsibility for minors attending matches beyond those matters covered by the Stadium Regulations.
- C) Photography and use of video including CCTV is in operation at all matches and events and may be used in any of our media channels as well as press releases.
- D) Dogs on a lead are permitted in the Stadium but they remain the sole responsibility of their owner at all times.
